Stupor as a Noun

Definitions of "Stupor" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stupor” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally.*
- *A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility.*
- *Marginal consciousness.*



Synonyms of "Stupor" as a noun (8 Words)

daze

A state of stunned confusion or bewilderment.

*He was walking around in a **daze**.*

grogginess

A dazed and staggering state caused by alcohol.

*His **grogginess** was caused as much by exhaustion as by the blows.*

semiconsciousness

Marginal consciousness.

shock

A disturbance causing instability in an economy.

*Electricians get accustomed to occasional **shocks**.*

state of senselessness

A state of depression or agitation.

state of stupefaction

The way something is with respect to its main attributes.

state of unconsciousness

The territory occupied by one of the constituent administrative districts of a nation.

stupefaction

The state of being stupefied.
*Salesmen stood in bored **stupefaction**.*



Usage Examples of "Stupor" as a noun

- *Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken stupor.*
- *A drunken stupor.*



Associations of "Stupor" (30 Words)

alcoholic	Characteristic of or containing alcohol. <i>Alcoholic liquor.</i>
<u>amaze</u>	Affect with wonder. <i>Your ability to speak six languages amazes me.</i>
bacchanal	A priest, worshipper, or follower of Bacchus. <i>A night of bacchanalian revelry.</i>
bacchanalian	Characterized by or given to drunken revelry. <i>A bacchanalian orgy.</i>
<u>beer</u>	A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops. <i>A pint of beer.</i>

bibulous	Excessively fond of drinking alcohol. <i>A bibulous evening.</i>
carousal	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
carouse	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>Corporate carouses.</i>
<u>coma</u>	The luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>After the film I settled into a coma.</i>
<u>daze</u>	Confusion characterized by lack of clarity. <i>His mother's death left him in a daze.</i>
drunken	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>A drunken binge.</i>
inebriate	Make (someone) drunk; intoxicate. <i>Inebriate times by the Bay.</i>
<u>inebriated</u>	Drunk; intoxicated. <i>Helplessly inebriated.</i>
inebriety	A temporary state resulting from excessive consumption of alcohol. <i>The ravages of inebriety.</i>
<u>intoxicated</u>	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>A noisy crowd of intoxicated sailors.</i>
oaf	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy oafs.</i>
plastered	Covered with a coat of plaster. <i>I went out and got totally plastered.</i>
<u>revel</u>	Enjoy oneself in a lively and noisy way, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Bill said he was secretly revelling in his new found fame.</i>
reveler	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract revelers as young as thirteen.</i>
<u>revelry</u>	Unrestrained merrymaking. <i>Sounds of revelry issued into the night.</i>
<u>sober</u>	Become sober after excessive alcohol consumption. <i>I ought to sober up a bit.</i>
spree	Take part in a spree. <i>A shopping spree.</i>
stun	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The community was stunned by the tragedy.</i>

surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>He surprised an interesting scene.</i>
tipple	Drink alcohol, especially habitually. <i>Those who liked to tipple and gamble.</i>
<u>tipsy</u>	Slightly drunk. <i>Tipsy revellers.</i>
<u>vertigo</u>	A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.
