trendsetting	Initiating or popularizing a trend.
up to date	Open.

voguish	In accord with the latest fad. A suit of voguish cut.

abreast	Side by side and facing the same way. <i>It makes sense to stay abreast of changes in the advertising business.</i>
<u>alongside</u>	Side by side. A small winglike projection attached to an aircraft forward of the main wing to provide extra stability or control, sometimes replacing the tail. <i>The old canard that LA is a cultural wasteland.</i>
canard	Elegant and stylish. <i>Chic elegance.</i>
<u>chic</u>	Cause to go crazy; cause to lose one's mind. <i>Internal stresses often caused the glue to craze.</i>
craze	Dominant course (suggestive of running water) of successive events or ideas. <i>Current psychoanalytic theories.</i>
current	Neat and trim in dress and appearance (typically used of a man). <i>A dapper young man.</i>
<u>dapper</u>	An interest followed with exaggerated zeal. <i>His fads about the type of coffee he must have.</i>
fad	Intensely fashionable or popular for a short period of time. <i>Superficial faddish approaches to spirituality.</i>
faddish	A popular or the latest style of clothing, hair, decoration, or behaviour. <i>The skins were fashioned into boots and shoes.</i>
fashion	Popular and considered appealing or fashionable at the time. <i>They risked being scoffed at by their more fashionable friends.</i>
<u>fashionable</u>	Showy tropical tree or shrub native to Madagascar; widely planted in tropical regions for its immense racemes of scarlet and orange flowers; sometimes placed in genus Poinciana. <i>Flamboyant handwriting.</i>
flamboyant	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>A jaunty optimist.</i>
jaunty	In the recent past. <i>Lately the rules have been enforced.</i>
lately	Of most recent date. <i>The latest news.</i>
<u>latest</u>	An unbranded calf or yearling. <i>Maverick politicians.</i>
maverick	

<u>modern</u>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Tables in modernistic designs.</i>
modish	In the current fashion or style. <i>It seems sad that such a scholar should feel compelled to use this modish jargon.</i>
natty	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>A palmtop computer with many natty features.</i>
offbeat	(informal) strikingly unconventional. <i>The answer sums up his offbeat skewed vision of the world.</i>
popular	(of music or art) new and of general appeal (especially among young people). <i>The popular vote.</i>
raffish	Unconventional and slightly disreputable, especially in an attractive way. <i>A cocktail party given by some raffish bachelors.</i>
rakish	Marked by a carefree unconventionality or disreputableness. <i>He had a rakish debonair look.</i>
recency	The property of having happened or appeared not long ago.
spruce	Light soft moderately strong wood of spruce trees used especially for timbers and millwork. <i>He spruced up for the party.</i>
unconventional	Not conforming to accepted rules or standards. <i>His unconventional approach to life.</i>
unorthodox	Independent in behavior or thought. <i>An unorthodox lifestyle.</i>
up-to-date	Provide with a dateline; mark with a date.
urbanity	Polished courtesy; elegance of manner. <i>A picture of banal urbanity.</i>
<u>vogue</u>	The popular taste at a given time. <i>Leather is the latest vogue.</i>
