## Subconscious as a Noun

### Definitions of "Subconscious" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “subconscious” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The subconscious part of the mind (not in technical use in psychoanalysis, where unconscious is preferred).*
- *Psychic activity just below the level of awareness.*



## Synonyms of "Subconscious" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>ego</b>	(in metaphysics) a conscious thinking subject. <i>He needed a boost to his <b>ego</b>.</i>
<b>essential nature</b>	Anything indispensable.
<b>id</b>	A card or badge used to identify the bearer. <i>The conflict between the drives of the <b>id</b> and the demands of the cultural superego.</i>
<b>imagination</b>	The ability of the mind to be creative or resourceful. <i>She was set in her ways and lacked <b>imagination</b>.</i>
<b>mind</b>	A person's memory. <i>I wrote a letter in my <b>mind</b>.</i>
<b>psyche</b>	That which is responsible for one's thoughts, feelings, and conscious brain functions; the seat of the faculty of reason. <i>Their childhood made them want to understand the human <b>psyche</b> and to help others.</i>

**self** Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else.  
*One's own **self**.*

**subconscious mind** Psychic activity just below the level of awareness.

**superego** The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers.  
*The father is the model for the **superego**.*

**unconscious mind** That part of the mind wherein psychic activity takes place of which the person is unaware.



### Usage Examples of "Subconscious" as a noun

- *Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her subconscious.*



## Subconscious as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Subconscious" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "subconscious" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Just below the level of consciousness.*
- *Of or concerning the part of the mind of which one is not fully aware but which influences one's actions and feelings.*



## Synonyms of "Subconscious" as an adjective (16 Words)

- concealed** Hidden on any grounds for any motive.  
***Concealed** or hidden damage.*
- deep** Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply.  
*The lake was **deep** and cold.*
- dormant** Temporarily inactive or inoperative.  
*The successful consortium included a **dormant** company.*
- hidden** Not accessible to view.  
*A **hidden** cave.*
- innate** Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development.  
*An **innate** talent.*

<b>innermost</b>	(of thoughts or feelings) most private and deeply felt. <i>One s <b>innermost</b> feelings.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	(of a person) doing or being a specified thing apparently naturally or automatically. <i>Offering to help was as <b>instinctive</b> as breathing.</i>
<b>intuitive</b>	Using or based on what one feels to be true even without conscious reasoning; instinctive. <i>His <b>intuitive</b> understanding of the readers real needs.</i>
<b><u>involuntary</u></b>	Not subject to the control of the will- John F.Kennedy. <i><b>Involuntary</b> manslaughter.</i>
<b>latent</b>	Not presently active. <i>A <b>latent</b> fingerprint.</i>
<b>repressed</b>	(of a thought or desire) kept suppressed and unconscious in one's mind. <i>The devastating implications of <b>repressed</b> sexuality.</i>
<b><u>subliminal</u></b>	Below the threshold of conscious perception.
<b>suppressed</b>	Kept from public knowledge by various means. <i>A <b>suppressed</b> press.</i>
<b><u>unconscious</u></b>	Not conscious; lacking awareness and the capacity for sensory perception as if asleep or dead. <i>Lay <b>unconscious</b> on the floor.</i>
<b><u>underlying</u></b>	In the nature of something though not readily apparent. <i><b>Underlying</b> principles.</i>
<b>unfulfilled</b>	Not carried out or brought to completion. <i>It was his <b>unfulfilled</b> ambition to write.</i>

## Associations of "Subconscious" (30 Words)

<b>alertness</b>	A state of readiness to respond. <i>Walsall were indebted to the bravery and <b>alertness</b> of their goalkeeper.</i>
<b>clairvoyance</b>	Apparent power to perceive things that are not present to the senses. <i>She stared at the card as if she could contact its writer by <b>clairvoyance</b>.</i>
<b>cognizance</b>	Having knowledge of. <i>The Renaissance <b>cognizance</b> of Greece was limited.</i>
<b>conscious</b>	Aware of and responding to one's surroundings. <i><b>Conscious</b> of having succeeded.</i>
<b><u>consciousness</u></b>	An alert cognitive state in which you are aware of yourself and your situation. <i>Her acute <b>consciousness</b> of Luke s presence.</i>
<b><u>dreaming</u></b>	A series of mental images and emotions occurring during sleep.



<b>folly</b>	The trait of acting stupidly or rashly. <i>An act of sheer <b>folly</b>.</i>
<b>hypnosis</b>	A state that resembles sleep but that is induced by suggestion. <i>I was regressed under <b>hypnosis</b>.</i>
<b>hypnotism</b>	The study or practice of hypnosis.
<b>idiot</b>	A stupid person. An ignorant or stupid person.
<b>ignoramus</b>	<i>Assume that your examiner is an <b>ignoramus</b> and explain everything to him.</i>
<b>ignorant</b>	Angry or quick-tempered. <i>He was told constantly that he was <b>ignorant</b> and stupid.</i>
<b>imbecility</b>	A stupid mistake.
<b><u>mental</u></b>	Of or relating to the chin- or liplike structure in insects and certain mollusks. <i>Free from <b>mental</b> defects.</i>
<b>mesmerism</b>	The therapeutic system of F. A. Mesmer.
<b>mind</b>	Keep in mind. <i>He had in <b>mind</b> to see his old teacher.</i>
<b><u>oblivious</u></b>	(followed by `to' or `of') lacking conscious awareness of. <i>She became absorbed <b>oblivious</b> to the passage of time.</i>
<b>parapsychology</b>	Phenomena that appear to contradict physical laws and suggest the possibility of causation by mental processes.
<b>psychoanalysis</b>	A set of techniques for exploring underlying motives and a method of treating various mental disorders; based on the theories of Sigmund Freud. <i>His physician recommended <b>psychoanalysis</b>.</i>
<b><u>psychological</u></b>	Of or relating to or determined by psychology. <i>It was concluded that her pain was <b>psychological</b>.</i>
<b>relaxation</b>	An occurrence of control or strength weakening. <i>His favourite form of <b>relaxation</b> was reading detective novels.</i>
<b><u>reverie</u></b>	An instrumental piece suggesting a dreamy or musing state. <i>I slipped into <b>reverie</b>.</i>
<b>semiconscious</b>	Partially conscious; not completely aware of sensations.
<b>sleep</b>	A period of time spent sleeping. <i>A photograph of the poet in his last <b>sleep</b>.</i>
<b><u>unaware</u></b>	Not aware. <i><b>Unaware</b> of the danger they were in.</i>

Without awareness.

**unconsciously** *Unconsciously* she has spent her whole life looking for a man who could live up to the ideal of her father.

**unwitting** Not done on purpose; unintentional.  
*We are anxious to rectify the **unwitting** mistakes made in the past.*

**vacuity** Total lack of meaning or ideas.  
*He denounced what he considered the frivolity or **vacuity** of much contemporary painting.*

**wakefulness** A periodic state during which you are conscious and aware of the world.  
*Wakefulness* watchfulness and bellicosity make a good hunter.
