Associations of "Subject matter" (30 Words)

answerable	(of a question) able to be answered. <i>Parents are answerable for their child s acts.</i>
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
caption	Provide with a caption as of a photograph or a drawing. <i>The programme has a closing caption thanking the university for its cooperation.</i>
communicue	An official report (usually sent in haste.
<u>contentious</u>	Causing or likely to cause an argument; controversial. <i>The socio economic plan had been the subject of contentious debate.</i>
contents	(usually plural) everything that is included in a collection and that is held or included in something. <i>He emptied the contents of his pockets.</i>
<u>controversial</u>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>Years of wrangling over a controversial bypass.</i>
<u>controversy</u>	Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. <i>The design of the building has caused controversy.</i>
<u>corporeal</u>	Affecting or characteristic of the body as opposed to the mind or spirit. <i>That which is created is of necessity corporeal and visible and tangible.</i>
<u>debatable</u>	Open to doubt or debate. <i>It is debatable whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
discussion	A detailed treatment of a topic in speech or writing. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed discussion.</i>
<u>enigma</u>	A difficult problem. <i>Madeleine was still an enigma to him.</i>
forum	A court or tribunal. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>

heading	A division of a subject; a class or category. <i>The heading seemed to have little to do with the text.</i>
<u>inquire</u>	Inquire about. <i>How well do you know Berlin he inquired of Hencke.</i>
inquiry	A search for knowledge. <i>He was one of the State s star witnesses in the murder inquiry.</i>
<u>interrogate</u>	Transmit (a signal) for setting off an appropriate response, as in telecommunication. <i>An interactive system enables users to interrogate the database.</i>
<u>interrogation</u>	An instance of questioning. <i>Would he keep his mouth shut under interrogation.</i>
interrogative	Some linguists consider interrogative sentences to constitute a mood. <i>An interrogative adverb.</i>
interrogatory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of an interrogation. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i>
<u>interview</u>	Go for an interview in the hope of being hired. <i>She was interviewed by a reporter from the Daily News.</i>
issue	Make out and issue. <i>The canyon had only one issue.</i>
<u>nosy</u>	Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>Nosy neighbours.</i>
philosophical	Of or relating to philosophy or philosophers. <i>He was philosophical about losing the contract.</i>
<u>query</u>	Ask a question about something, especially in order to express one's doubts about it or to check its validity or accuracy. <i>I rang the water company to query my bill.</i>
question	Ask someone questions especially in an official context. <i>He was ready to pop the question.</i>
<u>thematic</u>	Having or relating to subjects or a particular subject. <i>The book is organized into nine thematic chapters.</i>
theme	Provide with a particular theme or motive. <i>His letters were always on the theme of love.</i>
topic	A matter dealt with in a text, discourse, or conversation; a subject. <i>It was a very sensitive topic.</i>
<u>why</u>	The cause or intention underlying an action or situation especially in the phrase the whys and wherefores. <i>Why don t I give you a lift.</i>
