## Subjective as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Subjective" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “subjective” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Dependent on the mind or on an individual's perception for its existence.*
- *Taking place within the mind and modified by individual bias.*
- *Based on or influenced by personal feelings, tastes, or opinions.*
- *Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind.*
- *Relating to or denoting a case of nouns and pronouns used for the subject of a sentence.*

- emotional** Relating to a person's emotions.  
*He was a strongly **emotional** young man.*
- immanent** Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind.  
*A cognition is an **immanent** act of mind.*
- impressionistic** In the style of impressionism.  
*A personal and **impressionistic** view of the war.*
- individual** Separate and distinct from others of the same kind.  
*She creates her own highly **individual** landscapes.*
- instinctive** (of a person) doing or being a specified thing apparently naturally or automatically.  
*An **instinctive** distaste for conflict.*
- internal** Experienced in one's mind; inner rather than expressed.  
***Internal** party maneuvering.*

**intuitive**

(chiefly of computer software) easy to use and understand.  
*His **intuitive** understanding of the readers real needs.*

**personal**

Existing as a self aware entity not as an abstraction or an impersonal force.

*For your **personal** use.*

**personalized**

Pointedly referring to or concerning a person's individual personality or intimate affairs especially offensively.

*General elections have become **personalized** contests between rival party leaders.*

<b>bias</b>	Cause to be biased. <i>Readers said the paper was <b>biased</b> towards the Conservatives.</i>
<b>biased</b>	Favoring one person or side over another. <i>A <b>biased</b> account of the trial.</i>
<b>bigot</b>	A prejudiced person who is intolerant of any opinions differing from his own. <i>A racist <b>bigot</b>.</i>
<b>comparison</b>	The act of examining resemblances. <i>They made a <b>comparison</b> of noise levels.</i>
<b>discriminate</b>	Perceive or constitute the difference in or between. <i><b>Discriminate</b> people.</i>
<b>discriminatory</b>	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i><b>Discriminatory</b> employment practices.</i>

<b>gratuitous</b>	Done without good reason; uncalled for. <i>Solicitors provide a form of <b>gratuitous</b> legal advice.</i>
<b>incompleteness</b>	The state of being crude and incomplete and imperfect. <i>The study was criticized for <b>incompleteness</b> of data but it stimulated further research.</i>
<b>inequality</b>	The relation between two expressions that are not equal, employing a sign such as $\neq$ 'not equal to', $>$ 'greater than', or $<$ 'less than'. <i>The <b>inequality</b> of the ground hindered their footing.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Not equitable or fair. <i>The <b>inequitable</b> division of wealth.</i>
<b>inequity</b>	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial <b>inequity</b>.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>An <b>iniquitous</b> tax.</i>
<b>iniquity</b>	Immoral or grossly unfair behaviour. <i>A den of <b>iniquity</b>.</i>
<b>injustice</b>	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>
<b>intolerant</b>	Not tolerant of views, beliefs, or behaviour that differ from one's own. <i>He's recently been diagnosed as gluten <b>intolerant</b>.</i>
<b>invidious</b>	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>It seems <b>invidious</b> to make special mention of one aspect of his work.</i>
<b>jaundiced</b>	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. <i>They looked on politicians with a <b>jaundiced</b> eye.</i>
<b>partial</b>	A component of a musical sound; an overtone or harmonic. <i>A question to which we have only <b>partial</b> answers.</i>
<b>prejudiced</b>	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. <i><b>Prejudiced</b> views.</i>
<b>racism</b>	Prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism by an individual, community, or institution against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group, typically one that is a minority or marginalized. <i>A programme to combat <b>racism</b>.</i>
<b>racist</b>	A person with a prejudiced belief that one racial group is superior to others. <i>He has been targeted by vicious <b>racists</b> online.</i>
<b>sexist</b>	A person with sexist views. <i>A blatantly <b>sexist</b> remark.</i>

<b>tortious</b>	Of or pertaining to the nature of a tort. <i>This does not make the act <b>tortious</b>.</i>
<b><u>undeserved</u></b>	Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an <b>undeserved</b> reputation as a coward.</i>
<b>unequal</b>	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>I have lived for fifty years as an <b>unequal</b> in this country.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. <i>Used <b>unfair</b> methods.</i>
<b><u>unfavorable</u></b>	Not favorable. <i>An <b>unfavorable</b> comparison.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Not equitable or fair. <i>An <b>unjust</b> judge.</i>
<b>unmerited</b>	Not deserved or merited. <i>Received an <b>unmerited</b> honorary degree.</i>
<b><u>wrongly</u></b>	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <i><b>Wrongly</b> interpreted results.</i>
