Definitions of "Subjective" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “subjective” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Dependent on the mind or on an individual's perception for its existence.*
- *Taking place within the mind and modified by individual bias.*
- *Based on or influenced by personal feelings, tastes, or opinions.*
- *Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind.*
- *Relating to or denoting a case of nouns and pronouns used for the subject of a sentence.*

- emotional** Relating to a person's emotions.
*He was a strongly **emotional** young man.*
- immanent** Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind.
*A cognition is an **immanent** act of mind.*
- impressionistic** In the style of impressionism.
*A personal and **impressionistic** view of the war.*
- individual** Separate and distinct from others of the same kind.
*She creates her own highly **individual** landscapes.*
- instinctive** (of a person) doing or being a specified thing apparently naturally or automatically.
*An **instinctive** distaste for conflict.*
- internal** Experienced in one's mind; inner rather than expressed.
***Internal** party maneuvering.*

intuitive

(chiefly of computer software) easy to use and understand.
*His **intuitive** understanding of the readers real needs.*

personal

Existing as a self aware entity not as an abstraction or an impersonal force.

*For your **personal** use.*

personalized

Pointedly referring to or concerning a person's individual personality or intimate affairs especially offensively.

*General elections have become **personalized** contests between rival party leaders.*

bias	Cause to be biased. <i>Readers said the paper was biased towards the Conservatives.</i>
biased	Favoring one person or side over another. <i>A biased account of the trial.</i>
bigot	A prejudiced person who is intolerant of any opinions differing from his own. <i>A racist bigot.</i>
comparison	The act of examining resemblances. <i>They made a comparison of noise levels.</i>
discriminate	Perceive or constitute the difference in or between. <i>Discriminate people.</i>
discriminatory	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i>Discriminatory employment practices.</i>

gratuitous	Done without good reason; uncalled for. <i>Solicitors provide a form of gratuitous legal advice.</i>
incompleteness	The state of being crude and incomplete and imperfect. <i>The study was criticized for incompleteness of data but it stimulated further research.</i>
inequality	The relation between two expressions that are not equal, employing a sign such as \neq 'not equal to', $>$ 'greater than', or $<$ 'less than'. <i>The inequality of the ground hindered their footing.</i>
inequitable	Not equitable or fair. <i>The inequitable division of wealth.</i>
inequity	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial inequity.</i>
iniquitous	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>An iniquitous tax.</i>
iniquity	Immoral or grossly unfair behaviour. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
injustice	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora's remark.</i>
intolerant	Not tolerant of views, beliefs, or behaviour that differ from one's own. <i>He's recently been diagnosed as gluten intolerant.</i>
invidious	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>It seems invidious to make special mention of one aspect of his work.</i>
jaundiced	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. <i>They looked on politicians with a jaundiced eye.</i>
partial	A component of a musical sound; an overtone or harmonic. <i>A question to which we have only partial answers.</i>
prejudiced	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. <i>Prejudiced views.</i>
racism	Prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism by an individual, community, or institution against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group, typically one that is a minority or marginalized. <i>A programme to combat racism.</i>
racist	A person with a prejudiced belief that one racial group is superior to others. <i>He has been targeted by vicious racists online.</i>
sexist	A person with sexist views. <i>A blatantly sexist remark.</i>

tortious	Of or pertaining to the nature of a tort. <i>This does not make the act tortious.</i>
<u>undeserved</u>	Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an undeserved reputation as a coward.</i>
unequal	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>I have lived for fifty years as an unequal in this country.</i>
unfair	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. <i>Used unfair methods.</i>
<u>unfavorable</u>	Not favorable. <i>An unfavorable comparison.</i>
<u>unjust</u>	Not equitable or fair. <i>An unjust judge.</i>
unmerited	Not deserved or merited. <i>Received an unmerited honorary degree.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <i>Wrongly interpreted results.</i>
