- *Make subservient; force to submit or subdue.*
- *Put down by force or intimidation.*

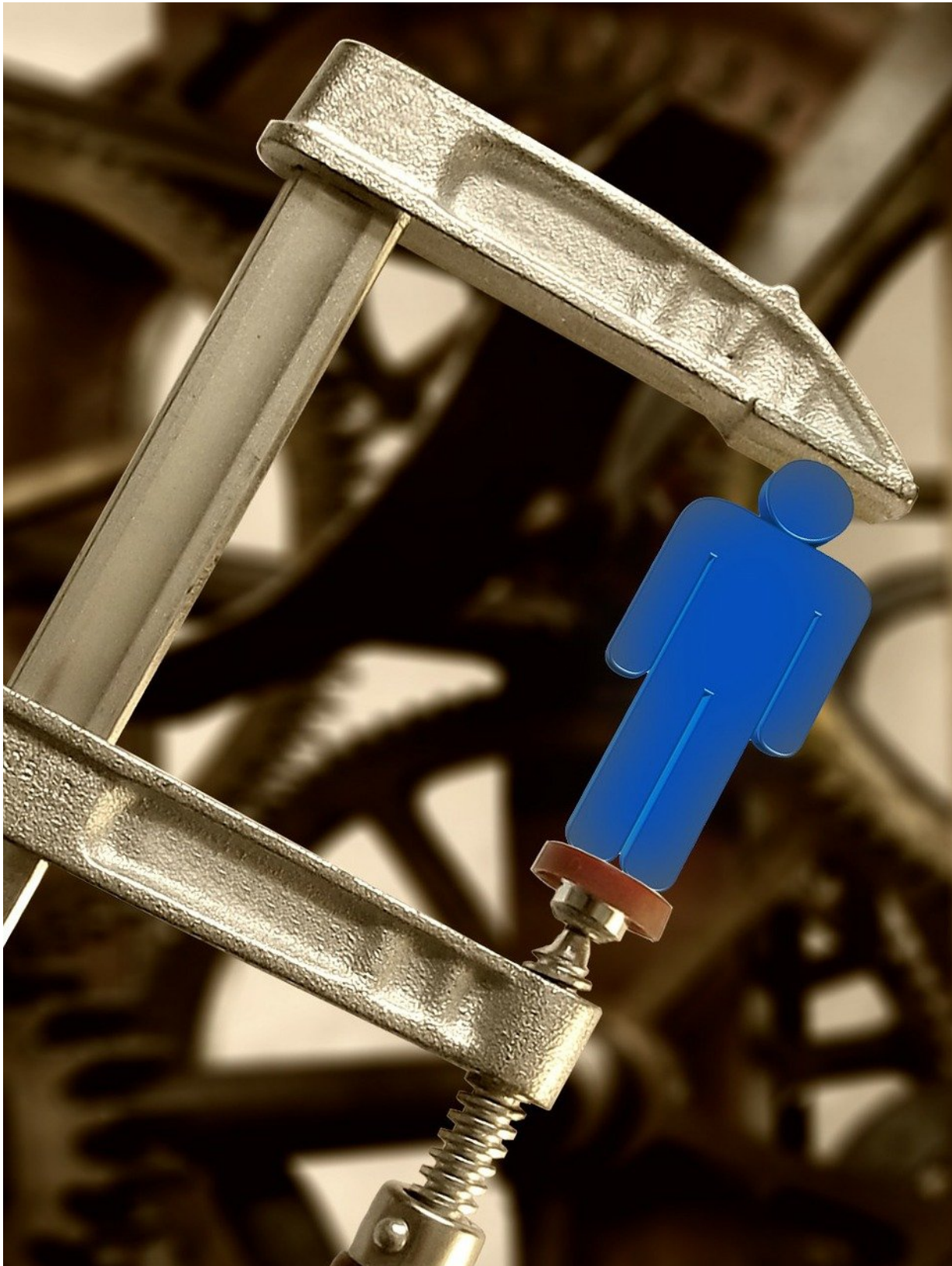


## Synonyms of "Subjugate" as a verb (20 Words)

<b>bring someone to their knees</b>	Bestow a quality on.
<b>bring to heel</b>	Be accompanied by.
<b>bring under the yoke</b>	Attract the attention of.
<b>conquer</b>	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <b>Conquer</b> your fears.
<b>crush</b>	Crush or bruise. <i>A labourer was <b>crushed</b> to death by a lorry.</i>
<b>defeat</b>	Prevent (an aim) from being achieved. <i>She was <b>defeated</b> by the last steep hill.</i>
<b>gain ascendancy over</b>	Increase (one's body weight).
<b>gain control of</b>	Increase or develop.

<b>gain mastery over</b>	Reach a destination, either real or abstract.
<b>hegemonize</b>	Subject (a population, region, process, etc.) to a dominant political or social power. <i>Globalization <b>hegemonizes</b> and controls the urban as well as rural poor.</i>
<b>keep down</b>	Raise.
<u><b>overcome</b></u>	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. <i>She was obviously <b>overcome</b> with excitement.</i>
<u><b>overpower</b></u>	Be too intense for; overwhelm. <i>They were <b>overpowered</b> by the fumes.</i>
<b>quash</b>	Reject as invalid, especially by legal procedure. <i>A hospital executive <b>quashed</b> rumours that nursing staff will lose jobs.</i>
<b>quell</b>	Put an end to (a rebellion or other disorder), typically by the use of force. <i><b>Quell</b> my hunger.</i>
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>Olga was <b>reduced</b> to stunned silence.</i>
<b>repress</b>	Put down by force or intimidation. <i>The thought that he had killed his brother was so terrible that he <b>repressed</b> it.</i>
<b>subdue</b>	Bring (a country or people) under control by force. <i>Charles went on a campaign to <b>subdue</b> the Saxons.</i>
<u><b>subject</b></u>	Cause or force someone or something to undergo (a particular experience or form of treatment, typically an unwelcome or unpleasant one). <i>The sergeant <b>subjected</b> the new recruits to many drills.</i>
<b>vanquish</b>	Defeat thoroughly. <i>He successfully <b>vanquished</b> his rival.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Subjugate" as a verb

- *The new ruler firmly subjugated the Church to the state.*
- *The rich landowners subjugated the peasants working the land.*
- *The invaders had soon subjugated most of the population.*

## Associations of "Subjugate" (30 Words)

<b>beat</b>	Indicate by beating as with the fingers or drumsticks. <i>The boat <b>beat</b> in the strong wind.</i>
<b>captor</b>	A person that catches or confines another. <i>He managed to escape from his <b>captors</b> two nights later.</i>
<b>chasten</b>	Restrain. <i>The director was somewhat <b>chastened</b> by his recent flops.</i>
<b><u>chastise</u></b>	Censure severely. <i>He <b>chastised</b> his colleagues for their laziness.</i>
<b>conquer</b>	Overcome by conquest. <i>They ve <b>conquered</b> new markets in Japan.</i>
<b>conquest</b>	The overcoming of a problem or weakness. <i>The <b>conquest</b> of space.</i>
<b>control</b>	Exercise authoritative control or power over. <i>The airflow is <b>controlled</b> by a fan.</i>
<b>curb</b>	Restrain a horse by means of a curb. <i>Plans to introduce tougher <b>curbs</b> on insider dealing.</i>
<b>defeat</b>	An instance of defeating or being defeated. <i>She had still not quite admitted <b>defeat</b>.</i>
<b>enslave</b>	Cause (someone) to lose their freedom of choice or action. <i>They were <b>enslaved</b> by their need to take drugs.</i>
<b>inhibit</b>	Prohibit, forbid, or prevent from doing something. <i><b>Inhibit</b> the rate of a chemical reaction.</i>
<b>inhibition</b>	A feeling that makes one self-conscious and unable to act in a relaxed and natural way. <i>The children at first shy soon lost their <b>inhibitions</b>.</i>
<b>limit</b>	Restrict or confine within limits. <i>There are <b>limits</b> on the amount you can bet.</i>
<b><u>oppress</u></b>	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>The government <b>oppresses</b> political activists.</i>

<b><u>oppression</u></b>	Mental pressure or distress. <i>Beatrice's mood had initially been alarm and a sense of <b>oppression</b>.</i>
<b><u>overcome</u></b>	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>You must <b>overcome</b> all difficulties.</i>
<b><u>overpower</u></b>	Be too intense for; overwhelm. <i>They were <b>overpowered</b> by the fumes.</i>
<b>predominance</b>	The possession or exertion of control or power. <i>Churches with a <b>predominance</b> of African American members.</i>
<b>repress</b>	Put out of one's consciousness. <i>The thought that he had killed his brother was so terrible that he <b>repressed</b> it.</i>
<b>restrain</b>	Deprive (someone) of freedom of movement or personal liberty. <i>The need to <b>restrain</b> public expenditure.</i>
<b>restrict</b>	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>Cities can <b>restrict</b> groups of protesters from gathering on a residential street.</i>
<b>subdue</b>	Hold within limits and control. <i>Charles went on a campaign to <b>subdue</b> the Saxons.</i>
<b>subjection</b>	The act of conquering. <i>The country's <b>subjection</b> to European colonialism.</i>
<b><u>subjugation</u></b>	Forced submission to control by others. <i>The colonial <b>subjugation</b> of a country by means of brute military force.</i>
<b><u>suppress</u></b>	Prevent or inhibit (a process or reaction). <i><b>Suppress</b> a smile.</i>
<b>suppression</b>	The restraint or repression of an idea, activity, or reaction by something more powerful. <i>A <b>suppression</b> of the newspaper.</i>
<b><u>surmount</u></b>	Stand or be placed on top of. <i>All manner of cultural differences were <b>surmounted</b>.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>
<b>tyrannize</b>	Rule a country as a tyrant. <i>She <b>tyrannized</b> her family.</i>
<b><u>tyranny</u></b>	A state under cruel and oppressive government. <i>The <b>tyranny</b> of her stepmother.</i>
