### Definitions of "Sublime" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sublime” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Change or cause to change directly from a solid into a vapor without first melting.*
- *Elevate to a high degree of moral or spiritual purity or excellence.*
- *(of a solid substance) change directly into vapour when heated, typically forming a solid deposit again on cooling.*
- *Cause (a substance) to sublime.*
- *Vaporize and then condense right back again.*



### **Synonyms of "Sublime" as a verb (1 Word)**

(in psychoanalytic theory) divert or modify (an instinctual impulse) into a **sublimate** culturally higher or socially more acceptable activity.  
*Attractive rhythms are **sublimated** into a much larger context.*

<b>grand</b>	The most important and magnificent in adornment. <i>A <b>grand</b> niece.</i>
<b>high-flown</b>	Pretentious (especially with regard to language or ideals).
<b>high-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>idealistic</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks. <i><b>Idealistic</b> young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
<b>imposing</b>	Impressive in appearance. <i>The monarch s <b>imposing</b> presence.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	(of wool and other textiles) thick and resilient. <i>A noble and <b>lofty</b> concept.</i>
<b>magnificent</b>	Extremely beautiful, elaborate, or impressive. <i><b>Magnificent</b> cathedrals.</i>
<b>majestic</b>	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i><b>Majestic</b> cities.</i>

<b>noble</b>	Impressive in appearance. <i>Severe looking policemen sat astride <b>noble</b> horses.</i>
<b>noble-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>rarefied</b>	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. <i>Lightheaded from the <b>rarefied</b> mountain air.</i>
<b>rarified</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>reverend</b>	Worthy of adoration or reverence. <i>The <b>Reverend</b> Pat Tilly.</i>
<b>supreme</b>	Final or last in your life or progress. <i><b>Supreme</b> courage.</i>
<b>total</b>	Complete; absolute. <i>A <b>total</b> cost of 4 000.</i>
<b>utter</b>	Complete. <i><b>Utter</b> nonsense.</i>

<b>heaven</b>	Used in various exclamations as a substitute for 'God'. <i>The everlasting happiness with God that we call <b>heaven</b>.</i>
<b>hierarchy</b>	A person who holds a high position in a hierarchy.
<b>high</b>	A state of high spirits or euphoria. <i>They took drugs to get a <b>high</b> on.</i>
<b>idealistic</b>	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i><b>Idealistic</b> young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
<b>imposing</b>	Used of a person's appearance or behavior; befitting an eminent person. <i>An <b>imposing</b> 17th century manor house.</i>
<b>impressive</b>	Making a strong or vivid impression. <i>Gave an <b>impressive</b> performance as Othello.</i>
<b>libertarian</b>	An advocate of libertarianism. <i>No true <b>libertarian</b> would ever support a culture where citizens must show their papers to travel.</i>
<b>magisterial</b>	Domineering; dictatorial. <i><b>Magisterial</b> officers.</i>

<b>noble</b>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>The medieval palace was once owned by a <b>noble</b> Florentine family.</i>
<b>palace</b>	A large, splendid house or place of entertainment. <i>The royal <b>palace</b>.</i>
<b>paradise</b>	The abode of Adam and Eve before the Fall in the biblical account of the Creation; the Garden of Eden. <i>My idea of <b>paradise</b> is to relax on the seafront.</i>
<b>prelate</b>	A bishop or other high ecclesiastical dignitary.
<b>protestant</b>	Of or relating to Protestants or Protestantism.
<b>raised</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i><b>Raised</b> metalwork.</i>
<b>regal</b>	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler. <i>Her <b>regal</b> bearing.</i>
<b>reverend</b>	A member of the clergy. <i>A retired <b>reverend</b>.</i>
<b>sacred</b>	Religious rather than secular. <i><b>Sacred</b> music.</i>
<b>stately</b>	Impressive or grand in size, appearance, or manner. <i>A <b>stately</b> procession.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Overcome by a <b>superior</b> opponent.</i>
<b>theologian</b>	A person who engages or is an expert in theology.
<b>utopia</b>	A work of fiction describing a utopia. <i>Misplaced faith in political <b>utopias</b> has led to ruin.</i>
