Submerge as a Verb

Definitions of "Submerge" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “submerge” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cover completely or make imperceptible.*
- *Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water.*
- *Cause (something) to be under water.*
- *Fill or cover completely, usually with water.*
- *Descend below the surface of an area of water.*
- *Put under water.*
- *Completely cover or obscure.*



Synonyms of "Submerge" as a verb (22 Words)

cloak

Dress in a cloak.
***Cloaked** monks.*

conceal

Prevent from being seen or discovered.
*They were at great pains to **conceal** that information from the public.*

deluge

Overwhelm with a flood.
*He has been **deluged** with offers of work.*

dive

(of a player) deliberately fall when challenged in order to deceive the referee into awarding a foul.
*The fish **dive** down to about 1 400 feet.*

drop

Let or cause to fall in drops.
*They **dropped** bombs on Caen during the raid.*

drown

Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning.
*The noise **drowned** out her speech.*

<u>engulf</u>	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>A feeling of anguish so great that it threatened to engulf him.</i>
flood	Cover or submerge an area with water in a flood. <i>Congratulatory messages flooded in.</i>
go down	Stop operating or functioning.
go under water	Give support (to) or make a choice (of) one out of a group or number.
hide	Conceal oneself. <i>He used to hide out in a cave.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>She immersed herself in her work.</i>
inundate	Fill or cover completely, usually with water. <i>We've been inundated with complaints from listeners.</i>
<u>overwhelm</u>	Bury or drown beneath a huge mass of something, especially water. <i>They were overwhelmed by farewell messages.</i>
<u>plummet</u>	Decrease rapidly in value or amount. <i>Hardware sales plummeted.</i>
<u>plunge</u>	Push or thrust quickly. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and plunged into a ravine.</i>
repress	Suppress (a thought or desire) so that it becomes or remains unconscious. <i>The thought that he had killed his brother was so terrible that he repressed it.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They agreed to sink their differences.</i>
submerge	Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i>
<u>suppress</u>	Prevent or inhibit (a process or reaction). <i>This drug can suppress the hemorrhage.</i>
<u>swamp</u>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>Feelings of guilt suddenly swamped her.</i>
<u>veil</u>	Cover with a veil. <i>Cold mists veiled the mountain peaks.</i>



Usage Examples of "Submerge" as a verb

- *Houses had been flooded and cars submerged.*
- *The U-boat had had time to submerge.*
- *The tensions submerged earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.*
- *Submerge your head completely.*



Associations of "Submerge" (30 Words)

absorb	Take up, as of debts or payments. <i>The sales tax is absorbed into the state income tax.</i>
awash	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. <i>The boat rolled violently her decks awash.</i>
<u>cascade</u>	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. <i>A cascade of pink bougainvillea.</i>
cloudburst	A sudden violent rainstorm.
deluge	A severe flood. <i>A deluge of complaints.</i>
<u>dive</u>	An instance of swimming or going deeper under water. <i>The jumbo jet went into a dive.</i>
downpour	A heavy rain. <i>A sudden downpour had filled the gutters and drains.</i>

drop	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>There was not a drop of water in sight.</i>
drown	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>When the ice melted the valleys were drowned.</i>
engross	Consume all of one's attention or time. <i>The notes totally engrossed him.</i>
engulf	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>The bright light engulfed him completely.</i>
flood	The biblical flood brought by God upon the earth because of the wickedness of the human race Gen 6 ff. <i>A tide in the affairs of men which taken at the flood leads on to fortune.</i>
flooded	Covered with water. <i>A flooded bathroom.</i>
flowage	The act of flooding; filling to overflowing. <i>Rock fracture and rock flowage are different types of geological deformation.</i>
freshet	A rush of fresh water flowing into the sea.
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>He immersed himself into his studies.</i>
immersion	The disappearance of a celestial body in the shadow of or behind another. <i>As a teacher she advocates learning by immersion.</i>
inundate	Overwhelm (someone) with things or people to be dealt with. <i>The islands may be the first to be inundated as sea levels rise.</i>
lowland	The region of Scotland lying south and east of the Highlands. <i>Lowland farming.</i>
overwhelm	Cover completely or make imperceptible. <i>Floodwaters overwhelmed hundreds of houses.</i>
plunge	Cause to be immersed. <i>To peel fruit cover with boiling water and then plunge them into iced water.</i>
rain	Precipitate as rain. <i>It s pouring with rain.</i>
rainstorm	A storm with rain.
sink	Cause to sink. <i>He saw the coffin sink below the surface of the waves.</i>

- soak** Fill soak or imbue totally.
*She spent some time **soaking** in a hot bath.*
- submergence** Sinking until covered completely with water.
*Total **submergence** of plants results in heavy crop losses.*
- submerge** Put under water.
*Pellets were then **submersed** in agar.*
- underwater** Beneath the surface of water.
*They learn to navigate **underwater** at night.*
- water** The water of a particular sea river or lake.
*My mouth **watered** at the prospect of a good dinner.*
- wet** Cause to become wet.
*She said she d **wet** the tea immediately because they must be parched.*
