### Submerge as a Verb

#### **Definitions of "Submerge" as a verb**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "submerge" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Cover completely or make imperceptible.
- Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water.
- Cause (something) to be under water.
- Fill or cover completely, usually with water.
- Descend below the surface of an area of water.
- Put under water.
- Completely cover or obscure.





## Synonyms of "Submerge" as a verb (22 Words)

<u>cloak</u>	Dress in a cloak. <b>Cloak</b> ed monks.
<u>conceal</u>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. They were at great pains to <b>conceal</b> that information from the public.
deluge	Overwhelm with a flood. He has been <b>deluge</b> d with offers of work.
<u>dive</u>	(of a player) deliberately fall when challenged in order to deceive the referee into awarding a foul. The fish <b>dive</b> down to about 1 400 feet.
drop	Let or cause to fall in drops. They <b>drop</b> ped bombs on Caen during the raid.
<u>drown</u>	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. The noise <b>drown</b> ed out her speech.



<u>engulf</u>	Devote (oneself) fully to. A feeling of anguish so great that it threatened to <b>engulf</b> him.
flood	Cover or submerge an area with water in a flood. Congratulatory messages <b>flood</b> ed in.
go down	Stop operating or functioning.
go under water	Give support (to) or make a choice (of) one out of a group or number.
hide	Conceal oneself. <i>He used to <b>hide</b> out in a cave.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. She <b>immerse</b> d herself in her work.
inundate	Fill or cover completely, usually with water. We ve been <b>inundate</b> d with complaints from listeners.
<u>overwhelm</u>	Bury or drown beneath a huge mass of something, especially water. They were <b>overwhelm</b> ed by farewell messages.
<u>plummet</u>	Decrease rapidly in value or amount. Hardware sales <b>plummet</b> ed.
<u>plunge</u>	Push or thrust quickly. A car swerved to avoid a bus and <b>plunge</b> d into a ravine.
repress	Suppress (a thought or desire) so that it becomes or remains unconscious. The thought that he had killed his brother was so terrible that he <b>repress</b> ed it.
sink	Cause a ship to sink. They agreed to <b>sink</b> their differences.
submerse	Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Pellets were then</i> <b>submerse</b> d in agar.
<u>suppress</u>	Prevent or inhibit (a process or reaction. This drug can <b>suppress</b> the hemorrhage.
<u>swamp</u>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. Feelings of guilt suddenly <b>swamp</b> ed her.
<u>veil</u>	Cover with a veil. Cold mists <b>veil</b> ed the mountain peaks.





#### Usage Examples of "Submerge" as a verb

- Houses had been flooded and cars submerged.
- The U-boat had had time to submerge.
- The tensions submerged earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.
- Submerge your head completely.





# Associations of "Submerge" (30 Words)

absorb	Take up, as of debts or payments. <i>The sales tax is <b>absorb</b>ed into the state income tax.</i>
awash	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain <i>The boat rolled violently her decks</i> <b>awash</b> .
<u>cascade</u>	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. A <b>cascade</b> of pink bougainvillea.
cloudburst	A sudden violent rainstorm.
deluge	A severe flood. A <b>deluge</b> of complaints.
<u>dive</u>	An instance of swimming or going deeper under water. <i>The jumbo jet went into a <b>dive</b>.</i>
downpour	A heavy rain. A sudden <b>downpour</b> had filled the gutters and drains.



drop	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>There was not a <b>drop</b> of water in sight.</i>
<u>drown</u>	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. When the ice melted the valleys were <b>drown</b> ed.
engross	Consume all of one's attention or time. The notes totally <b>engross</b> ed him.
<u>engulf</u>	Devote (oneself) fully to. The bright light <b>engulf</b> ed him completely.
flood	The biblical flood brought by God upon the earth because of the wickedness of the human race Gen 6 ff. <i>A tide in the affairs of men which taken at the <b>flood</b> leads on to fortune.</i>
<u>flooded</u>	Covered with water. A <b>flooded</b> bathroom.
flowage	The act of flooding; filling to overflowing. Rock fracture and rock <b>flowage</b> are different types of geological deformation.
freshet	A rush of fresh water flowing into the sea.
immerse	Cause to be immersed. He <b>immerse</b> d himself into his studies.
immersion	The disappearance of a celestial body in the shadow of or behind another. <i>As a teacher she advocates learning by <b>immersion</b>.</i>
inundate	Overwhelm (someone) with things or people to be dealt with. The islands may be the first to be <b>inundate</b> d as sea levels rise.
lowland	The region of Scotland lying south and east of the Highlands. <i>Lowland farming.</i>
overwhelm	Cover completely or make imperceptible. Floodwaters <b>overwhelm</b> ed hundreds of houses.
<u>plunge</u>	Cause to be immersed. To peel fruit cover with boiling water and then <b>plunge</b> them into iced water.
rain	Precipitate as rain. It s pouring with <b>rain</b> .
rainstorm	A storm with rain.
sink	Cause to sink. He saw the coffin <b>sink</b> below the surface of the waves.



<u>soak</u>	Fill soak or imbue totally. She spent some time <b>soak</b> ing in a hot bath.
submergence	Sinking until covered completely with water. Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.
submerse	Put under water. Pellets were then <b>submerse</b> d in agar.
underwater	Beneath the surface of water. They learn to navigate <b>underwater</b> at night.
water	The water of a particular sea river or lake. My mouth <b>water</b> ed at the prospect of a good dinner.
wet	Cause to become wet. She said she d <b>wet</b> the tea immediately because they must be parched.
