<b>endorse</b>	Recommend (a product) in an advertisement. <i>She s had her licence <b>endorsed</b>.</i>
<b>give</b>	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>The heavy door didn t <b>give</b> until the fifth push.</i>
<b>give money</b>	Give as a present; make a gift of.

<b>inscribe</b>	Write or carve (words or symbols) on something, especially as a formal or permanent record. <i>He <b>inscribed</b> the first copy To my dearest grandmother.</i>
<b>make a contribution</b>	Induce to have sex.
<b>make a donation</b>	Constitute the essence of.

<b>periodic</b>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The <b>periodic</b> appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	A magazine or newspaper published at regular intervals. <i>Britain s best <b>periodical</b> art magazine.</i>
<b>post</b>	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>This military <b>post</b> provides an important source of income for the town nearby.</i>
<b>postage</b>	The sending of letters and parcels by post. <i>Proof of <b>postage</b> is required.</i>
<b>publication</b>	The business of issuing printed matter for sale or distribution. <i>The <b>publication</b> of April trade figures.</i>
<b>publisher</b>	The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>A commercial music <b>publisher</b>.</i>
<b>quarterly</b>	Done, produced, or occurring once every quarter of a year. <i>Interest is paid <b>quarterly</b>.</i>
<b>reader</b>	A proofreader. <i>She s an avid <b>reader</b>.</i>
<b>readership</b>	The readers of a newspaper, magazine, or book regarded collectively. <i>The magazine has a <b>readership</b> of just 65 000.</i>
<b>registered</b>	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. <i><b>Registered</b> bonds.</i>
<b>semiannual</b>	Occurring or payable twice each year.
<b>subscriber</b>	A person who receives a publication regularly by paying in advance. <i>The company has 2 6 million <b>subscribers</b> to its digital service.</i>
<b>weekly</b>	A newspaper or periodical issued every week. <i>She visited her aunt <b>weekly</b>.</i>
