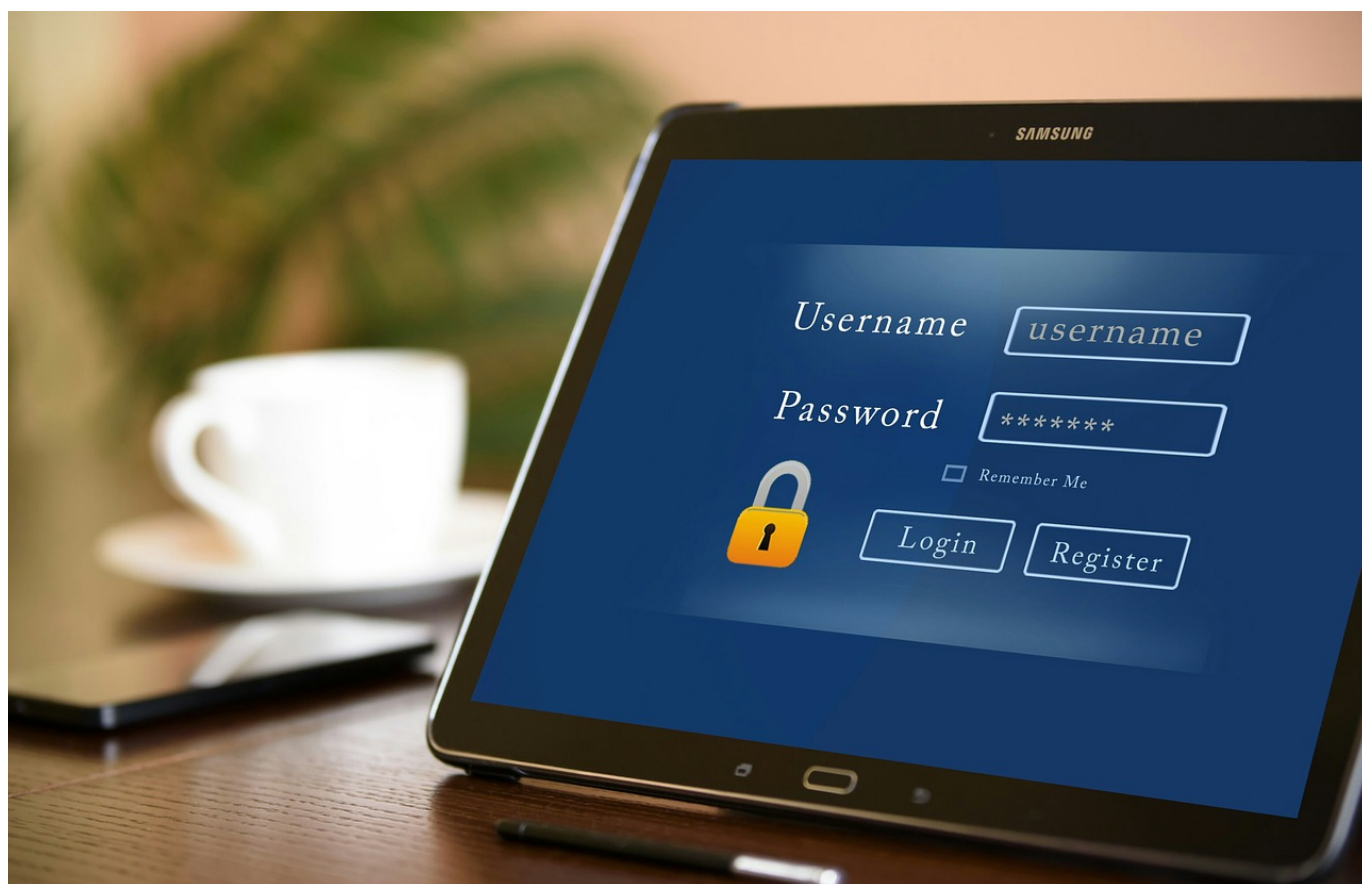
Subscribe as a Verb

- *Express or feel agreement with (an idea or proposal.*
- *Sign (a will, contract, or other document.*
- *Arrange to receive something, typically a publication, regularly by paying in advance.*
- *Adopt as a belief.*
- *Mark with one's signature; write one's name (on.*
- *Receive or obtain regularly.*

- *Pay (an amount of money) as a contribution to a charity or service, especially at regular intervals.*
- *Offer to buy, as of stocks and shares.*
- *Contribute or undertake to contribute a certain sum of money to a fund, project, or cause, typically on a regular basis.*
- *Sign (one's name) on a will, contract, or other document.*

*Staff who **witnessed** the murder.*

write

Write music.
*He couldn't read or **write**.*

- *The course has been fully subscribed.*
- *They subscribed to the July rights issue at 300p a share.*

- *He ventured still to subscribe himself her most obedient servant.*

Associations of "Subscribe" (30 Words)

advisory	An announcement that usually advises or warns the public of some threat. <i>A frost advisory.</i>
airmail	Send or transport by airmail. <i>Instructions were sent by airmail.</i>
<u>annual</u>	An annual plant. <i>The sponsored walk became an annual event.</i>
annually	By the year; every year (usually with reference to a sum of money paid or received). <i>Sales are increasing by about 17 annually.</i>
<u>article</u>	The definite or indefinite article. <i>An article of clothing.</i>
biennial	Botany a plant having a life cycle that normally takes two seasons from germination to death to complete flowering biennials usually bloom and fruit in the second season. <i>The top antiques fairs are the Milan and Florence biennials.</i>
bimonthly	Done, produced, or occurring twice a month or every two months. <i>The magazine appears bimonthly.</i>
contributor	A person who donates to a cause. <i>Australia is also a major contributor of development assistance to the region.</i>
diurnal	Daily; of each day. <i>Diurnal aberration.</i>
editor	Computer science a program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>A sports editor.</i>
encyclopedia	A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.
<u>journal</u>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>He reads the medical journals.</i>
<u>literacy</u>	The ability to read and write. <i>Adult literacy programmes.</i>
magazine	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>Tripped over a pile of magazines.</i>
mailing	The transmission of a letter. <i>The postmark indicates the time of mailing.</i>

monthly	Occurring once a month. <i>The monthly newsletter.</i>
newspaper	A business firm that publishes newspapers. <i>Ms Henry joined the newspaper 10 months ago.</i>
periodic	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
periodical	A magazine or newspaper published at regular intervals. <i>Britain s best periodical art magazine.</i>
post	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>This military post provides an important source of income for the town nearby.</i>
postage	The sending of letters and parcels by post. <i>Proof of postage is required.</i>
publication	The business of issuing printed matter for sale or distribution. <i>The publication of April trade figures.</i>
publisher	The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>A commercial music publisher.</i>
quarterly	Done, produced, or occurring once every quarter of a year. <i>Interest is paid quarterly.</i>
reader	A proofreader. <i>She s an avid reader.</i>
readership	The readers of a newspaper, magazine, or book regarded collectively. <i>The magazine has a readership of just 65 000.</i>
registered	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. <i>Registered bonds.</i>
semiannual	Occurring or payable twice each year.
subscriber	A person who receives a publication regularly by paying in advance. <i>The company has 2 6 million subscribers to its digital service.</i>
weekly	A newspaper or periodical issued every week. <i>She visited her aunt weekly.</i>
