Associations of "Subscribe" (30 Words)

advisory	An announcement that usually advises or warns the public of some threat. <i>A frost advisory.</i>
airmail	Send or transport by airmail. Instructions were sent by airmail .
<u>annual</u>	An annual plant. The sponsored walk became an annual event.
annually	By the year; every year (usually with reference to a sum of money paid or received. Sales are increasing by about 17 annually .
<u>article</u>	The definite or indefinite article. An article of clothing.
biennial	Botany a plant having a life cycle that normally takes two seasons from germination to death to complete flowering biennials usually bloom and fruit in the second season. The top antiques fairs are the Milan and Florence biennial s.
bimonthly	Done, produced, or occurring twice a month or every two months. <i>The magazine appears bimonthly.</i>
contributor	A person who donates to a cause. Australia is also a major contributor of development assistance to the region.
diurnal	Daily; of each day. <i>Diurnal</i> aberration.
editor	Computer science a program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>A sports editor.</i>
encyclopedia	A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.
<u>journal</u>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>He reads the medical journals.</i>
<u>literacy</u>	The ability to read and write. Adult literacy programmes.
magazine	A business firm that publishes magazines. Tripped over a pile of magazine s.
mailing	The transmission of a letter. The postmark indicates the time of mailing .



monthly	Occurring once a month. The monthly newsletter.
newspaper	A business firm that publishes newspapers. Ms Henry joined the newspaper 10 months ago.
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.
periodical	A magazine or newspaper published at regular intervals. Britain s best periodical art magazine.
post	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. This military post provides an important source of income for the town nearby.
postage	The sending of letters and parcels by post. Proof of postage is required.
<u>publication</u>	The business of issuing printed matter for sale or distribution. The publication of April trade figures.
publisher	The proprietor of a newspaper. A commercial music publisher .
quarterly	Done, produced, or occurring once every quarter of a year. Interest is paid quarterly .
reader	A proofreader. She s an avid reader .
readership	The readers of a newspaper, magazine, or book regarded collectively. <i>The magazine has a readership of just 65 000.</i>
registered	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. Registered bonds.
semiannual	Occurring or payable twice each year.
subscriber	A person who receives a publication regularly by paying in advance. The company has 2 6 million subscriber s to its digital service.
<u>weekly</u>	A newspaper or periodical issued every week. <i>She visited her aunt weekly.</i>
