Subsistence as a Noun

Definitions of "Subsistence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “subsistence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The means of maintaining or supporting oneself.*
- *The state of remaining in force or effect.*
- *Denoting or relating to production at a level sufficient only for one's own use or consumption, without any surplus for trade.*
- *The state of existing in reality; having substance.*
- *The action or fact of maintaining or supporting oneself, especially at a minimal level.*
- *A means of surviving.*
- *Minimal (or marginal) resources for subsisting.*

A flat portable surface (usually rectangular) designed for board games.

existence

The fact or state of living or having objective reality.
*He believed in the essential unity of all **existence**.*

keep

The cost of the essentials for living.
*If from shepherd s **keep** a lamb strayed far.*

life

A sentence of imprisonment for life.
*Real **life**.*

livelihood

The financial means whereby one lives.
*People whose **livelihoods** depend on the rainforest.*

living

People who are still living.
*He was offered the **living** of St Katherine s.*

- *Farming is a hard means of subsistence.*

- *Social security provided only a bare subsistence.*

| rural | Living in or characteristic of farming or country life. <i>Rural people.</i> |
| subsist | Provide sustenance for. <i>Many people in the world have to subsist on 1 a day.</i> |
| survive | Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal). <i>He has survived several assassination attempts.</i> |

- sustain** An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released.
*He **sustained** the role of Creon with burly resilience.*
- sustenance** The maintaining of someone or something in life or existence.
*He kept two or three cows for the **sustenance** of his family.*
- uphold** Stand up for; stick up for; of causes, principles, or ideals.
*They **uphold** a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.*
- upkeep** The act of sustaining life by food or providing a means of subsistence.
*Payments for the children s **upkeep**.*
- victuals** A stock or supply of foods.
- withstand** Resist or confront with resistance.
*The structure had been designed to **withstand** winds of more than 100 mph.*
- yeoman** A member of the yeomanry force.
