Definitions of "Subsistence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “subsistence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The means of maintaining or supporting oneself.*
- *The state of remaining in force or effect.*
- *Denoting or relating to production at a level sufficient only for one's own use or consumption, without any surplus for trade.*
- *The state of existing in reality; having substance.*
- *The action or fact of maintaining or supporting oneself, especially at a minimal level.*
- *A means of surviving.*
- *Minimal (or marginal) resources for subsisting.*

existence

The fact or state of living or having objective reality.

*If from shepherd s **keep** a lamb strayed far.*

life

A sentence of imprisonment for life.
*Real **life**.*

livelihood

The financial means whereby one lives.
*People whose **livelihoods** depend on the rainforest.*

People who are still living.
*He was offered the **living** of St Katherine s.*

maintenance	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>Unlike champerty criminal maintenance does not necessarily involve personal profit.</i>
support	Supporting structure that holds up or provides a foundation. <i>The policy found little public support.</i>
<u>survival</u>	The state or fact of continuing to live or exist, typically in spite of an accident, ordeal, or difficult circumstances. <i>His shorts were a survival from his army days.</i>
<u>upkeep</u>	The process of keeping something in good condition. <i>Payments for the children s upkeep.</i>



Usage Examples of "Subsistence" as a noun

- *The garden provided not only subsistence but a little cash crop.*
- *The minimum income needed for subsistence.*
- *Subsistence agriculture.*
- *Farming is a hard means of subsistence.*
- *Rights of occupation normally only continue during the subsistence of the marriage.*

- *Social security provided only a bare subsistence.*

livelihood	A means of securing the necessities of life. <i>People whose livelihoods depend on the rainforest.</i>
maintenance	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>A chance of going to university with fees and maintenance paid.</i>
<u>meager</u>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager fare.</i>
<u>nourishment</u>	The act of nourishing. <i>Tubers from which plants obtain nourishment.</i>
nutriment	Nourishment; sustenance. <i>The bees reprocess the food and extract the last particle of nutriment from it.</i>
<u>nutrition</u>	The branch of science that deals with nutrients and nutrition particularly in humans. <i>A guide to good nutrition.</i>
outlast	Live or last longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i>
poverty	The state of being inferior in quality or insufficient in amount. <i>The poverty of her imagination.</i>
<u>rural</u>	Living in or characteristic of farming or country life. <i>Rural people.</i>
subsist	Provide sustenance for. <i>Many people in the world have to subsist on 1 a day.</i>
<u>survive</u>	Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal). <i>He has survived several assassination attempts.</i>

<u>sustain</u>	An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released. <i>He sustained the role of Creon with burly resilience.</i>
<u>sustenance</u>	The maintaining of someone or something in life or existence. <i>He kept two or three cows for the sustenance of his family.</i>
<u>uphold</u>	Stand up for; stick up for; of causes, principles, or ideals. <i>They uphold a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.</i>
<u>upkeep</u>	The act of sustaining life by food or providing a means of subsistence. <i>Payments for the children s upkeep.</i>
<u>victuals</u>	A stock or supply of foods.
<u>withstand</u>	Resist or confront with resistance. <i>The structure had been designed to withstand winds of more than 100 mph.</i>
<u>yeoman</u>	A member of the yeomanry force.
