elusive	Difficult to remember. <i>Success will become ever more elusive.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Anything you want is fine by me Linda.</i>
ingenious	(of a machine or idea) cleverly and originally devised and well suited to its purpose. <i>An ingenious solution to the problem.</i>
insidious	Beguiling but harmful. <i>Sexual harassment is a serious and insidious problem.</i>
intelligent	(of a computer terminal) incorporating a microprocessor and having its own processing capability. <i>An intelligent guess.</i>
keen	Having or showing great perception or insight. <i>Ear splitting explosive bursts keen and sharp.</i>
low-key	Restrained in style or quality.
minute	Infinitely or immeasurably small. <i>Two minute whiplike threads of protoplasm.</i>
muted	(of colour or lighting) not bright; subdued. <i>Muted trumpets.</i>

narrow	Denoting a vowel pronounced with the root of the tongue drawn back so as to narrow the pharynx. <i>The narrow sense of a word.</i>
nice	(especially of a difference) slight or subtle. <i>A nice gesture.</i>
overnice	Excessively fastidious and easily disgusted. <i>Mildred was overnice in regard to their father.</i>
penetrating	(of a sound) clearly heard through or above other sounds. <i>The students asked some penetrating questions.</i>
perceptive	Of or relating to perception. <i>A perceptive observation.</i>
<u>pernicious</u>	Having a harmful effect, especially in a gradual or subtle way. <i>The pernicious influences of the mass media.</i>
<u>precise</u>	Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>The director was precise with his camera positions.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>A quick inspection.</i>
razor-sharp	As sharp as a razor.
sagacious	Having or showing keen mental discernment and good judgement; wise or shrewd. <i>Observant and thoughtful he was given to asking sagacious questions.</i>
<u>sensitive</u>	Being susceptible to the attitudes, feelings, or circumstances of others. <i>A mimosa's leaves are sensitive to touch.</i>
<u>sharp</u>	Having or emitting a high pitched and sharp tone or tones. <i>Her sharp disappointment was tinged with embarrassment.</i>
shrewd	Used of persons. <i>She was shrewd enough to guess the motive behind his gesture.</i>
skilful	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>A skilful midfielder.</i>
subdued	Lacking in light; not bright or harsh. <i>I felt strangely subdued as I drove home.</i>
<u>tenuous</u>	Very weak or slight. <i>A tenuous fluid.</i>
<u>understated</u>	Presented or expressed in a subtle and effective way. <i>Understated elegance.</i>
wily	Marked by skill in deception. <i>A wily old attorney.</i>

intangible	An intangible thing. <i>Intangible assets such as good will.</i>
intricacy	Details, especially of an involved or perplexing subject. <i>The intricacy of the procedure.</i>
manipulative	Relating to manipulation of an object or part of the body. <i>A manipulative skill.</i>
nuance	Give nuances to. <i>The effect of the music is nuanced by the social situation of listeners.</i>
obscure	Make obscure or unclear. <i>Grey clouds obscure the sun.</i>

symbolism

Symbolic meaning attributed to natural objects or facts.

*He has always believed in the importance of **symbolism** in garden art.*

tricky

Having concealed difficulty.

*I wouldn't trust her she's **tricky**.*

undercurrent

A current below the surface of a fluid.

*Racial **undercurrents**.*

undertone

A quiet or hushed tone of voice.

*They were talking in **undertones**.*

vague

Not precisely limited, determined, or distinguished.

*Many patients suffer **vague** symptoms.*

wily

Skilled at gaining an advantage, especially deceitfully.

*A **wily** old attorney.*
