<u>revolutionary</u>	A radical supporter of political or social revolution.
revolutionist	A radical supporter of political or social revolution.
subverter	A radical supporter of political or social revolution.
<u>traitor</u>	A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
<u>troublemaker</u>	Someone who deliberately stirs up trouble.

inflammatory	Characterized or caused by inflammation. <i>Inflammatory remarks.</i>
insurgent	Relating to rebels. <i>Alleged links with insurgent groups.</i>
libertarian	An advocate of libertarianism. <i>A lot of people are very libertarian they just haven't heard the term.</i>
nationalist	Relating to nationalists or nationalism. <i>He was a staunch nationalist during his 22 years in power.</i>
nationalize	Transfer (a major branch of industry or commerce) from private to state ownership or control. <i>In the 13th and 14th centuries church designs were further nationalized.</i>
nihilist	A person who believes that life is meaningless and rejects all religious and moral principles. <i>It is impossible to argue against a nihilist.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>Their subversive activities are calculated to overthrow parliamentary democracy.</i>
political	Relating to the government or public affairs of a country. <i>I'm not very political.</i>
<u>politician</u>	A person who is professionally involved in politics, especially as a holder of an elected office. <i>A local politician.</i>
privatize	Transfer (a business, industry, or service) from public to private ownership and control. <i>They were opposed to plans to privatize electricity and water.</i>
<u>proletariat</u>	The lowest class of citizens in ancient Rome. <i>The growth of the industrial proletariat.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>The workers were protesting economic measures enacted a week earlier.</i>
<u>provocative</u>	Intended or intending to arouse sexual desire or interest. <i>A provocative article.</i>

<u>radical</u>	A person who has radical ideas or opinions. <i>In the body free radicals are high energy particles that ricochet wildly and damage cells.</i>
<u>rebel</u>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Tory rebels.</i>
<u>revolt</u>	Feel disgust. <i>The peasants rose in revolt.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	Relating to a particular revolution, especially the War of American Independence. <i>A revolutionary discovery.</i>
<u>seditionous</u>	Inciting or causing people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch. <i>The letter was declared seditionous.</i>
<u>socialist</u>	Advocating or following the socialist principles. <i>Socialistic government.</i>
<u>traitor</u>	Someone who betrays his country by committing treason. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
<u>treason</u>	The crime of murdering someone to whom the murderer owed allegiance, such as a master or husband. <i>Doubt is the ultimate treason against faith.</i>
<u>utopia</u>	A work of fiction describing a utopia. <i>Misplaced faith in political utopias has led to ruin.</i>
