Definitions of "Succeeding" as an adjective

- *Coming after or following.*
- *(of elected officers) elected but not yet serving.*
- *Coming after something in time; subsequent.*

Synonyms of "Succeeding" as an adjective (2 Words)

future Effective in or looking toward the future.
*His **future** wife.*

next Nearest in space or position; immediately adjoining without intervening space.
*The **next** president.*

- *Over the succeeding decades, recording equipment got cheaper.*

achieve	To gain with effort. <i>He achieved his ambition to become a press photographer.</i>
achievement	The action of accomplishing something. <i>A sense of achievement.</i>
acquire	Learn or develop (a skill, habit, or quality). <i>I acquired a passing knowledge of Chinese.</i>
acquirement	The action of acquiring something. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i>
acquisition	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The legacy will be used for new acquisitions.</i>
along	To a more advanced state. <i>We drove along admiring the view.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>After he published his book he had arrived.</i>
<u>attain</u>	Reach a point in time, or a certain state or level. <i>Clarify your objectives and ways of attaining them.</i>
<u>attainment</u>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The attainment of independence.</i>
chase	Try to obtain (something owed or required). <i>The policeman chased the mugger down the alley.</i>
clinch	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>The nails were clinched.</i>
come	Come under be classified or included. <i>The sleeves come to your knuckles.</i>
conformism	Orthodoxy in thoughts and belief.
<u>conformist</u>	Conforming to accepted behaviour or established practices; conventional. <i>Organizations where employees are loyal without being unthinking conformists.</i>
<u>ensue</u>	Issue or terminate (in a specified way, state, etc.); end. <i>The difficulties which ensued from their commitment to Cuba.</i>
follow	Come as a logical consequence follow logically. <i>A terrible tsunami followed the earthquake.</i>

gain	Obtain or secure (something wanted or desirable). <i>The peace movement gained momentum.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>We ll get them.</i>
jubilant	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
jubilation	A joyful occasion for special festivities to mark some happy event. <i>Unbelievable scenes of jubilation.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	Behavior intended to please your parents. <i>Children were taught to show their parents obedience.</i>
reach	A distance traversed in reaching. <i>He reached over and turned off his bedside light.</i>
success	An attainment that is successful. <i>I must make a success of my business.</i>
<u>trace</u>	Discover traces of. <i>Police are trying to trace a white van seen in the area.</i>
track	The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track. <i>The title track of the album.</i>
<u>triumph</u>	(of a Roman general) ride into ancient Rome after a victory. <i>The agreement was a triumph for common sense.</i>
<u>triumphant</u>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He couldn't suppress a triumphant smile.</i>
<u>victory</u>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>A victory celebration.</i>
win	Win something through one's efforts. <i>Many lived to win the great cave.</i>
