Synonyms of "Successive" as an adjective (14 Words)

<u>consecutive</u>	Following each other continuously. <i>Five consecutive months of serious decline.</i>
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>Lived in continuous fear.</i>
following	Immediately following in time or order. <i>Tried to outrun the following footsteps.</i>
in a row	Holding office.
in succession	Currently fashionable.
running	Done while running. <i>In running or working order.</i>
sequent	Following in a sequence or as a logical conclusion. <i>The period of tension and consequent need for military preparedness.</i>

- sequential** Forming or following in a logical order or sequence.
***Sequential** processing of data files.*
- serial** Pertaining to or composed in serial technique.
*A **serial** publication.*
- solid** Of good quality and condition solidly built.
*A **solid** base hit.*
- straight** Simple straightforward.
*He gave her a **straight** no nonsense look.*
- succeeding** Coming after or following.
*Over the **succeeding** decades recording equipment got cheaper.*
- unbroken** Marked by continuous or uninterrupted extension in space or time or sequence.
***Unbroken** land.*
- uninterrupted** Having undisturbed continuity.
*The window gives an **uninterrupted** view of the mountains.*



Usage Examples of "Successive" as an adjective

- *They were looking for their fifth successive win.*



Associations of "Successive" (30 Words)

alphabetical	In the order of the letters of the alphabet. <i>An alphabetical index.</i>
cession	The formal giving up of rights, property, or territory by a state. <i>The cession of twenty important towns.</i>
concatenate	Add by linking or joining so as to form a chain or series. <i>Concatenate characters.</i>
<u>consecutive</u>	In a consecutive manner. <i>A consecutive pattern of what the film would be like.</i>
constant	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. <i>A constant friend.</i>

<u>continual</u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Continual is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i>
<u>continuation</u>	The act of continuing an activity without interruption. <i>The continuation of discussions about a permanent peace.</i>
continuity	The unbroken and consistent existence or operation of something over time. <i>They have provided the country with a measure of continuity.</i>
continuous	(of a function) of which the graph is a smooth unbroken curve, i.e. one such that as the value of x approaches any given value a, the value of f(x) approaches that of f(a) as a limit. <i>A continuous rearrangement of electrons in the solar atoms results in the emission of light.</i>
<u>episode</u>	A section between two choric songs in Greek tragedy. <i>Acute psychotic episodes.</i>
homologous	(of chromosomes) pairing at meiosis and having the same structural features and pattern of genes. <i>A seal's flipper is homologous with the human arm.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
interlocking	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A design of interlocking leaves.</i>
<u>nonstop</u>	Occurring without stops. <i>A nonstop flight to Atlanta.</i>
ordered	Having a systematic arrangement; especially having elements succeeding in order according to rule. <i>An ordered sequence.</i>
perpetual	Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>Hell's perpetual fires.</i>
<u>repetitive</u>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>A repetitive task.</i>
row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Rows of barbed wire protected the trenches.</i>
sequel	A published, broadcast, or recorded work that continues the story or develops the theme of an earlier one. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its sequel.</i>

sequence	Arrange in a sequence. <i>Trainee librarians decide how a set of misfiled cards could be sequenced.</i>
sequential	Performed or used in sequence. <i>A series of sequential steps.</i>
serial	A serialized set of programs. <i>He was a serial adulterer.</i>
seriatim	In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters seriatim.</i>
series	A serialized set of programs. <i>A series III SWB Land Rover.</i>
streak	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>Had a streak of bad luck.</i>
subsequence	Following in time. <i>An affair which appeared in due subsequence in the newspapers.</i>
succession	A number of people or things of a similar kind following one after the other. <i>A succession of failures.</i>
successively	Immediately one after another. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
unceasing	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
uninterrupted	(of a view) unobstructed. <i>The window gives an uninterrupted view of the mountains.</i>
