| epigrammatic | Terse and witty and like a maxim. <i>An epigrammatic style.</i> |
| gnomic | Expressed in or of the nature of short, pithy maxims or aphorisms. <i>I had to have the gnomic response interpreted for me.</i> |
| in a few well-chosen words | Directed or bound inward. |
| laconic | (of a person, speech, or style of writing) using very few words. <i>His laconic reply suggested a lack of interest in the topic.</i> |
| <u>pithy</u> | Concise and full of meaning- Hervey Allen. <i>His characteristically pithy comments.</i> |
| short | Marked by rude or peremptory shortness. <i>The bed was too short for him.</i> |
| short and sweet | Tending to crumble or break into flakes due to a large amount of shortening. |
| summary | Briefly giving the gist of something. <i>Summary financial statements.</i> |
| synoptic | Presenting a summary or general view of a whole. <i>A synoptic model of higher education.</i> |
| <u>terse</u> | Brief and to the point; effectively cut short. <i>A terse statement.</i> |
| tight | Pressed tightly together. <i>Tight money.</i> |

| abbreviate | Shorten. <i>Network is often abbreviated to net.</i> |
| abbreviated | (of clothing) very short. <i>An abbreviated version of the earlier work.</i> |
| abbreviation | Shortening something by omitting parts of it. <i>Nursing records must be written without abbreviation.</i> |
| abridgment | A shortened version of a written work. |
| <u>abstract</u> | Dealing with a subject in the abstract without practical purpose or intention. <i>A big unframed abstract.</i> |
| <u>brevity</u> | The use of brief expressions. <i>The brevity of human life.</i> |
| <u>brief</u> | Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>It was only his briefs eloquence that had saved him from prison.</i> |
| <u>briefly</u> | In a concise manner; in a few words. <i>As I briefly mentioned earlier.</i> |
| <u>compact</u> | Make more compact by or as if by pressing. <i>A compact summary of the play.</i> |
| compendious | Containing or presenting the essential facts of something in a comprehensive but concise way. <i>A compendious study.</i> |
| <u>concise</u> | Expressing much in few words. <i>A concise explanation.</i> |
| context | Discourse that surrounds a language unit and helps to determine its interpretation. <i>The proposals need to be considered in the context of new European directives.</i> |
| <u>encapsulate</u> | Enclose (a message or signal) in a set of codes that allow transfer across networks. <i>The company would encapsulate the asbestos waste in concrete pellets.</i> |
| ephemeral | An ephemeral plant. <i>The ephemeral joys of childhood.</i> |
| <u>fleeting</u> | Lasting for a markedly brief time. <i>A fleeting glance.</i> |

| fugitive | Someone who flees from an uncongenial situation. <i>Fugitives from justice.</i> |
| interlude | Perform an interlude. <i>Enjoying a lunchtime interlude.</i> |
| momentary | Lasting for a very short time; brief. <i>A momentary lapse of concentration.</i> |
| overview | Give a general review or summary of. <i>The treasurer gave a brief overview of the financial consequences.</i> |
| pithiness | Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words. |
| <u>pithy</u> | Concise and full of meaning- Hervey Allen. <i>His characteristically pithy comments.</i> |
| precis | Make a precis of a text or speech. |
| sententious | Abounding in or given to pompous or aphoristic moralizing- Kathleen Barnes. <i>The peculiarly sardonic and sententious style in which Don Luis composed his epigrams.</i> |
| short | Of a broker position in the market etc buying or based on short stocks or other securities or commodities. <i>Short in stature.</i> |
| succinctness | Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words. |
| summary | Performed speedily and without formality. <i>Summary justice.</i> |
| <u>synopsis</u> | An outline of the plot of a play, film, or book. <i>A synopsis of the insurance cover provided is set out below.</i> |
| <u>terse</u> | Brief and to the point; effectively cut short. <i>Short and terse and easy to understand.</i> |
| transitory | Lasting a very short time. <i>Love is transitory but it is eternal.</i> |
| truncate | Terminating abruptly by having or as if having an end or point cut off. <i>Truncate a word.</i> |
