### Definitions of "Succumb" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “succumb” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Die from the effect of a disease or injury.*
- *Fail to resist pressure, temptation, or some other negative force.*
- *Be fatally overwhelmed.*
- *Consent reluctantly.*



## Synonyms of "Succumb" as a verb (12 Words)

<b>be a fatality of</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>buckle under</b>	Fasten with a buckle or buckles.
<b>capitulate</b>	Cease to resist an opponent or an unwelcome demand; yield. <i>The patriots had to <b>capitulate</b> to the enemy forces.</i>
<b>cave in</b>	Hollow out as if making a cave or opening.
<b>die from</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
<b>die of</b>	Stop operating or functioning.
<b>give in</b>	Be the cause or source of.
<b>give way</b>	Guide or direct, as by behavior of persuasion.
<b>pass away as a result of</b>	Transmit information.

**submit**

(especially in judicial contexts) suggest; argue.  
*The United States refused to **submit** to arbitration.*

**surrender**

Stop resisting to an enemy or opponent and submit to their authority.

*The last Taleban fighters finally **surrendered**.*

**yield**

Give way to arguments, demands, or pressure.

*I **yielded** the point.*



**Usage Examples of "Succumb" as a verb**

- *We cannot merely give up and succumb to despair.*
- *After a few blows there, the porcupine succumbs.*

**Associations of "Succumb" (30 Words)**

**abjure** Solemnly renounce (a belief, cause, or claim).  
*She **abjured** her beliefs.*

**analgesia** Medication that acts to relieve pain.  
*She was able to take **analgesia** orally.*

**bowed** Showing an excessively deferential manner.

<b>capitulate</b>	Cease to resist an opponent or an unwelcome demand; yield. <i>The patriots had to <b>capitulate</b> to the enemy forces.</i>
<b>cede</b>	Give up (power or territory). <i>In 1874 the islands were <b>ceded</b> to Britain.</i>
<b>concession</b>	A commercial operation set up by agreement within the premises of a larger concern. <i>The government was unwilling to make any further <b>concessions</b>.</i>
<b>condescend</b>	Treat condescendingly. <i>Take care not to <b>condescend</b> to your reader.</i>
<b>condescension</b>	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior. <i>I m treated with <b>condescension</b>.</i>
<b>crouch</b>	A crouching stance or posture. <i>He dropped into a defensive <b>crouch</b>.</i>
<b>disease</b>	A particular quality or disposition regarded as adversely affecting a person or group of people. <i>Heart <b>disease</b>.</i>
<b>generate</b>	Produce (energy). <i>The computer <b>generated</b> this image.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A right or privilege that has been granted. <i>Her request was <b>granted</b>.</i>
<u><b>illness</b></u>	A disease or period of sickness affecting the body or mind. <i>I ve never missed a day s work through <b>illness</b>.</i>
<b>injunction</b>	A judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i><b>Injunction</b> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<b>kneel</b>	Supporting yourself on your knees. <i>In church you have to <b>kneel</b> during parts of the service.</i>
<u><b>obedience</b></u>	Behavior intended to please your parents. <i><b>Obedience</b> to moral standards.</i>
<u><b>obey</b></u>	Behave in accordance with (a general principle, natural law, etc). <i>When the order was repeated he refused to <b>obey</b>.</i>
<b>relinquish</b>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>He <b>relinquished</b> his managerial role to become chief executive.</i>
<b>resignation</b>	An act of ending a game by conceding defeat without being checkmated. <i>A shrug of <b>resignation</b>.</i>
<b>servile</b>	Having or showing an excessive willingness to serve or please others. <i><b>Servile</b> work.</i>

<b>slavish</b>	Showing no attempt at originality. <i>A <b>slavish</b> adherence to protocol.</i>
<b>stoop</b>	Bend one's back forward from the waist on down. <i>The princes now and then <b>stooped</b> to pay a nominal homage.</i>
<b>submission</b>	Something (manuscripts or architectural plans and models or estimates or works of art of all genres etc.) submitted for the judgment of others (as in a competition). <i>Reports should be prepared for <b>submission</b> at partners meetings.</i>
<b>submissive</b>	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant. <i>A <b>submissive</b> reply.</i>
<u><b>submit</b></u>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly. <i>Samples <b>submitted</b> to low pressure while being airfreighted.</i>
<b>subservience</b>	Abject or cringing submissiveness. <i>Blind <b>subservience</b> to authority.</i>
<u><b>subservient</b></u>	Abjectly submissive; characteristic of a slave or servant- S.H.Adams. <i>She has become submissive and <b>subservient</b>.</i>
<u><b>surrender</b></u>	The action of surrendering a lease or life insurance policy. <i>The last Taleban fighters finally <b>surrendered</b>.</i>
<u><b>ultimatum</b></u>	A final peremptory demand. <i>Their employers issued an <b>ultimatum</b> demanding an immediate return to work.</i>
<b>yield</b>	An amount of a product. <i>The Western powers now <b>yielded</b> when they should have resisted.</i>
