| abjure | Solemnly renounce (a belief, cause, or claim. <i>MPs were urged to abjure their Jacobite allegiance.</i> |
| analgesia | The inability to feel pain. <i>She was able to take analgesia orally.</i> |
| bowed | Forming or resembling an arch. |
| capitulate | Cease to resist an opponent or an unwelcome demand; yield. <i>The patriots had to capitulate to the enemy forces.</i> |
| cede | Give up (power or territory). <i>In 1874 the islands were ceded to Britain.</i> |
| concession | The right, given by a company, to sell goods, especially in a particular place. <i>New logging concessions.</i> |
| condescend | Treat condescendingly. <i>Take care not to condescend to your reader.</i> |
| condescension | The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior. <i>I m treated with condescension.</i> |
| crouch | A crouching stance or posture. <i>He crouched down.</i> |
| disease | A disorder of structure or function in a human, animal, or plant, especially one that produces specific symptoms or that affects a specific location and is not simply a direct result of physical injury. <i>Bacterial meningitis is quite a rare disease.</i> |
| generate | Produce (energy). <i>The computer generated this image.</i> |
| grant | A right or privilege that has been granted. <i>They will grant you asylum.</i> |

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| <u>illness</u> | A disease or period of sickness affecting the body or mind. <i>He died after a long illness.</i> |
| injunction | A formal command or admonition. <i>Injunction were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i> |
| kneel | Rest one's weight on one's knees. <i>In church you have to kneel during parts of the service.</i> |
| <u>obedience</u> | Observance of a monastic rule. <i>Obedience to moral standards.</i> |
| <u>obey</u> | Be obedient to. <i>The universe was complex but it obeyed certain rules.</i> |
| relinquish | Turn away from; give up. <i>I am relinquishing my bedroom to the long term house guest.</i> |
| resignation | An act of resigning from a job or office. <i>I ve handed in my resignation.</i> |
| servile | Of or characteristic of a slave or slaves. <i>Brown s attempt at servile insurrection.</i> |
| slavish | Servile or submissive. <i>A slavish yes man to the party bosses.</i> |
| stoop | Bend one's head or body forwards and downwards. <i>The rocks stooped down over the hiking path.</i> |
| submission | The condition of having submitted to control by someone or something else. <i>A written submission to the UN.</i> |
| submissive | Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. <i>Submissive servants.</i> |
| <u>submit</u> | Hand over formally. <i>The United States refused to submit to arbitration.</i> |
| subservience | Abject or cringing submissiveness. <i>All his actions were in subservience to the general plan.</i> |
| <u>subservient</u> | Serving or acting as a means or aid. <i>The whole narration is subservient to the moral plan of exemplifying twelve virtues in twelve knights.</i> |
| <u>surrender</u> | The action of surrendering to an opponent or powerful influence. <i>The UK is opposed to surrendering its monetary sovereignty.</i> |

ultimatum

A final demand or statement of terms, the rejection of which will result in retaliation or a breakdown in relations.

*Their employers issued an **ultimatum** demanding an immediate return to work.*

yield

Be willing to concede.

*He **yielded** to the demands of his partners.*
