| ascend | Go up or climb. <i>The path ascended to the top of the hill.</i> |
| ascending | The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The ascending staircase.</i> |
| ascent | A movement upward. <i>The first ascent of the Matterhorn.</i> |
| boost | Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>He gave her a boost over the fence.</i> |
| <u>climb</u> | An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>The air became colder as they climbed higher.</i> |
| <u>climbing</u> | The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>Climbing equipment.</i> |
| <u>elevate</u> | Raise the axis of (a piece of artillery) to increase its range. <i>The field guns were elevated twenty degrees.</i> |
| elevator | A platform or compartment housed in a shaft for raising and lowering people or things to different levels; a lift. <i>In the harbour a giant elevator stores prairie grain.</i> |
| escalator | A stairway whose steps move continuously on a circulating belt. |
| high | A state of high spirits or euphoria. <i>A foot high.</i> |
| <u>hoist</u> | Lifting device for raising heavy or cumbersome objects. <i>Hoist the bicycle onto the roof of the car.</i> |
| ladder | With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>One of Sally s stockings developed a ladder.</i> |
| lift | A wave that lifts the surface of the water or ground. <i>Some actresses have more than one face lift.</i> |

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| mounting | The action of mounting something. <i>The mounting of rapid fire guns.</i> |
| precipitate | A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. <i>Our economy precipitated into complete ruin.</i> |
| promote | Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>Some regulation is still required to promote competition.</i> |
| raise | Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>God raised Jesus from the dead.</i> |
| rise | The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>The officer was a man of great courage who had risen from the ranks.</i> |
| risen | Above the horizon. <i>The risen sun.</i> |
| rising | Newly come into prominence. <i>The reforms led to peasant risings.</i> |
| soar | Fly upwards or high in the sky. <i>The dollar soared against the yen.</i> |
| soaring | (of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i>The soaring crime rate.</i> |
| stairs | A flight of stairs or a flight of steps. |
| stepladder | A folding portable ladder hinged at the top. |
| underpin | Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i> |
| uphill | Towards the top of a hill or slope. <i>An uphill struggle to gain worldwide recognition.</i> |
| upstairs | On or to an upper floor of a building. <i>I tiptoed upstairs.</i> |
| upward | Moving, pointing, or leading to a higher place, point, or level. <i>The cards were face upward.</i> |
| vertically | At right angles to a horizontal plane; aligned in such a way that the top is directly above the bottom. <i>Vertically stacked books.</i> |
| zoom | Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The camera zoomed in for a close up of his face.</i> |
