- *Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.*
- *Be given to.*
- *Undergo or suffer.*
- *Experience (emotional) pain.*
- *Feel unwell or uncomfortable.*
- *Get worse.*
- *Feel physical pain.*
- *Be set at a disadvantage.*



Synonyms of "Suffers" as a verb (18 Words)

- abide** (of a feeling or memory) continue without fading or being lost.
*At least one memory will **abide**.*
- ache** Have a desire for something or someone who is not present.
*My legs **ached** from the previous day s exercise.*
- bear** (of a tree or plant) produce (fruit or flowers).
*The squash **bears** fruit shaped like cucumbers.*
- brook** Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.
- digest** Soften or disintegrate, as by undergoing exposure to heat or moisture.
*I cannot **digest** milk products.*
- endure** Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.
*These cities have **endured** through time.*
- get** Take vengeance on or get even.
*She didn t **get** the joke.*
- have** Have or possess either in a concrete or an abstract sense.
***Have** a lover.*
- hurt** Hurt the feelings of.
*Were you **hurting** after the accident.*
- lose** Miss from one s possessions lose sight of.
*This clock will neither gain nor **lose** a second.*

- meet** Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
*Icebergs are created when glaciers **meet** the sea.*
- put up** Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
- stand** Withstand the force of something.
*Students should consider where they **stand** on this issue.*
- stick out** Stick to firmly.
- stomach** Endure or accept (an obnoxious thing or person).
*If you cannot **stomach** orange juice try apple juice.*
- support** Give moral or psychological support aid or courage to.
*The evidence **supports** the defendant.*
- sustain** (of a performer) represent (a part or character) convincingly.
*We **sustained** the diplomatic negotiations as long as possible.*
- tolerate** Be capable of continued subjection to (a drug, toxin, or environmental condition) without adverse reaction.
*He learned to **tolerate** the heat.*



Usage Examples of "Suffers" as a verb

- *She suffered a fracture in the accident.*
- *His grades suffered.*
- *He suffered the penalty.*
- *She suffers from a tendency to talk too much.*
- *Many saints suffered martyrdom.*

Associations of "Suffers" (30 Words)

<u>ache</u>	Feel an intense desire for. <i>He had stomach ache.</i>
<u>alas</u>	By bad luck. <i>Alas I cannot stay.</i>
bleeding	The flow of blood from a ruptured blood vessel. <i>She looks so bleeding bored all day.</i>
calvary	Any experience that causes intense suffering.
concussion	Temporary unconsciousness or confusion caused by a blow on the head. <i>He was carried off the pitch with concussion.</i>
damaged	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>I won't buy damaged goods.</i>

dementia	A chronic or persistent disorder of the mental processes caused by brain disease or injury and marked by memory disorders, personality changes, and impaired reasoning.
disgrace	Cause (someone) to fall from favour or a position of power or honour. <i>John stiffened his jaw so he wouldn't disgrace himself by crying.</i>
dishonor	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>He dishonored his family by committing a serious crime.</i>
doom	Death, destruction, or some other terrible fate. <i>This decision will doom me to lose my position.</i>
fail	A mistake failure or instance of poor performance. <i>His first product demo was full of fail.</i>
forgetfulness	Lapse of memory. <i>She teased him for his forgetfulness.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Dogs and cats with hurt paws.</i>
ignominy	Public shame or disgrace. <i>Suffered the ignominy of being sent to prison.</i>
lacerate	Deeply hurt the feelings of; distress. <i>Lacerate leaves.</i>
lament	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>His mother's night long laments for his father.</i>
martyrdom	Any experience that causes intense suffering. <i>The martyrdom of St Anthony.</i>
mischance	An unpredictable outcome that is unfortunate. <i>Innumerable mischances might ruin the enterprise.</i>
misery	A person who is constantly miserable or discontented. <i>A man who had brought her nothing but misery.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>It pains me to say this.</i>
persecution	Persistent annoyance or harassment. <i>Her family fled religious persecution.</i>
regrettably	Unfortunately (used to express apology for or sadness at something). <i>Regrettably last night's audience was a meagre one.</i>
rheumatism	A chronic autoimmune disease with inflammation of the joints and marked deformities; something (possibly a virus) triggers an attack on the synovium by the immune system, which releases cytokines that stimulate an inflammatory reaction.

shame	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>What a shame Ellie won't be here.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>A message of hope for suffering humanity.</i>
throes	Violent pangs of suffering. <i>He convulsed in his death throes.</i>
traumatic	Relating to or denoting physical injury. <i>Few experiences are more traumatic than losing a child.</i>
twinge	A sudden, sharp localized pain. <i>He felt a twinge in his knee.</i>
unfortunately	By bad luck. <i>Unfortunately it rained all day.</i>
wounded	People who are wounded. <i>They had to leave the wounded where they fell.</i>
