- bear** (of a tree or plant) produce (fruit or flowers).  
*The squash **bears** fruit shaped like cucumbers.*
- brook** Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.
- digest** Soften or disintegrate, as by undergoing exposure to heat or moisture.

- endure** Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.  
*These cities have **endured** through time.*
- get** Take vengeance on or get even.

*Were you **hurting** after the accident.*
- lose** Miss from one s possessions lose sight of.  
*This clock will neither gain nor **lose** a second.*

- meet** Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.  
*Icebergs are created when glaciers **meet** the sea.*
- put up** Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
- stand** Withstand the force of something.  
*Students should consider where they **stand** on this issue.*
- stick out** Stick to firmly.
- stomach** Endure or accept (an obnoxious thing or person).  
*If you cannot **stomach** orange juice try apple juice.*
- support** Give moral or psychological support aid or courage to.  
*The evidence **supports** the defendant.*
- sustain** (of a performer) represent (a part or character) convincingly.  
*We **sustained** the diplomatic negotiations as long as possible.*
- tolerate** Be capable of continued subjection to (a drug, toxin, or environmental condition) without adverse reaction.  
*He learned to **tolerate** the heat.*

<b><a href="#">ache</a></b>	Feel an intense desire for. <i>He had stomach <b>ache</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">alas</a></b>	By bad luck. <i><b>Alas</b> I cannot stay.</i>
<b>bleeding</b>	The flow of blood from a ruptured blood vessel. <i>She looks so <b>bleeding</b> bored all day.</i>
<b>calvary</b>	Any experience that causes intense suffering.
<b>concussion</b>	Temporary unconsciousness or confusion caused by a blow on the head. <i>He was carried off the pitch with <b>concussion</b>.</i>
<b>damaged</b>	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>I won't buy <b>damaged</b> goods.</i>

<b>dementia</b>	A chronic or persistent disorder of the mental processes caused by brain disease or injury and marked by memory disorders, personality changes, and impaired reasoning.
<b>disgrace</b>	Cause (someone) to fall from favour or a position of power or honour. <i>John stiffened his jaw so he wouldn't <b>disgrace</b> himself by crying.</i>
<b>dishonor</b>	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>He <b>dishonored</b> his family by committing a serious crime.</i>
<b>doom</b>	Death, destruction, or some other terrible fate. <i>This decision will <b>doom</b> me to lose my position.</i>
<b>fail</b>	A mistake failure or instance of poor performance. <i>His first product demo was full of <b>fail</b>.</i>
<b>forgetfulness</b>	Lapse of memory. <i>She teased him for his <b>forgetfulness</b>.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Dogs and cats with <b>hurt</b> paws.</i>
<b>ignominy</b>	Public shame or disgrace. <i>Suffered the <b>ignominy</b> of being sent to prison.</i>
<b>lacerate</b>	Deeply hurt the feelings of; distress. <i><b>Lacerate</b> leaves.</i>
<b>lament</b>	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>His mother's night long <b>laments</b> for his father.</i>
<b>martyrdom</b>	Any experience that causes intense suffering. <i>The <b>martyrdom</b> of St Anthony.</i>
<b>mischance</b>	An unpredictable outcome that is unfortunate. <i>Innumerable <b>mischances</b> might ruin the enterprise.</i>
<b>misery</b>	A person who is constantly miserable or discontented. <i>A man who had brought her nothing but <b>misery</b>.</i>
<b>pain</b>	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>It <b>pains</b> me to say this.</i>
<b>persecution</b>	Persistent annoyance or harassment. <i>Her family fled religious <b>persecution</b>.</i>
<b>regrettably</b>	Unfortunately (used to express apology for or sadness at something). <i><b>Regrettably</b> last night's audience was a meagre one.</i>
<b>rheumatism</b>	A chronic autoimmune disease with inflammation of the joints and marked deformities; something (possibly a virus) triggers an attack on the synovium by the immune system, which releases cytokines that stimulate an inflammatory reaction.

<b>shame</b>	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>What a <b>shame</b> Ellie won't be here.</i>
<b>suffering</b>	Psychological suffering. <i>A message of hope for <b>suffering</b> humanity.</i>
<b>throes</b>	Violent pangs of suffering. <i>He convulsed in his death <b>throes</b>.</i>
<b>traumatic</b>	Relating to or denoting physical injury. <i>Few experiences are more <b>traumatic</b> than losing a child.</i>
<b>twinge</b>	A sudden, sharp localized pain. <i>He felt a <b>twinge</b> in his knee.</i>
<b>unfortunately</b>	By bad luck. <i><b>Unfortunately</b> it rained all day.</i>
<b>wounded</b>	People who are wounded. <i>They had to leave the <b>wounded</b> where they fell.</i>
