<b>answer one's needs</b>	Match or correspond.
<b>answer the purpose</b>	Match or correspond.
<b>be adequate</b>	Be priced at.
<b>be enough</b>	Form or compose.
<b>be sufficient</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>They are free to <b>do</b> as they please.</i>

<b>fulfil one's needs</b>	Put in effect.
<b>meet one's needs</b>	Undergo or suffer.
<b>meet requirements</b>	Collect in one place.
<b>pass muster</b>	Grant authorization or clearance for.
<b>satisfy demands</b>	Fill or meet a want or need.
<b>serve</b>	Do duty or hold offices serve in a specific function. <i>They <b>serve</b> wine instead of beer.</i>
<b>serve the purpose</b>	Be used by; as of a utility.

- A quick look should suffice.

<b>abundance</b>	The quantity or amount of something present in a particular area, volume, or sample. <i>The tropical island boasts an <b>abundance</b> of wildlife.</i>
<b>abundant</b>	Having plenty of. <i>The riverbanks were <b>abundant</b> in beautiful wild plants.</i>
<b>abundantly</b>	Extremely. <i>My boss made it <b>abundantly</b> clear that if I didn't like it I should look for another job.</i>
<b>adequate</b>	About average; acceptable. <i>The food was <b>adequate</b>.</i>
<b><u>affluent</u></b>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. <i>The so called emerging <b>affluents</b>.</i>
<b>ample</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>There is <b>ample</b> time for discussion.</i>
<b>amply</b>	Sufficiently; more than adequately. <i>The evidence <b>amply</b> or fully confirms our suspicions.</i>
<b>bountiful</b>	Giving generously. <i><b>Bountiful</b> compliments.</i>
<b>bountifulness</b>	The property of copious abundance.

<b>bounty</b>	A sum paid by the state to army or navy recruits on enlistment. <i>For millennia the people along the Nile have depended entirely on its <b>bounty</b>.</i>
<b>copious</b>	Large in number or quantity (especially of discourse). <i>She took <b>copious</b> notes.</i>
<b>copiously</b>	In large quantities. <i>His book is <b>copiously</b> annotated with references to the current debates.</i>
<b>enough</b>	An adequate quantity a quantity that is large enough to achieve a purpose. <i><b>Enough</b> food.</i>
<b>fecundation</b>	Making fertile as by applying fertilizer or manure.
<b>full</b>	Make a garment fuller by pleating or gathering. <i><b>Full</b> tones.</i>
<b>galore</b>	Existing in abundance. <i>Whiskey <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>A <b>lot</b> of money.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	(of vegetation) rich and profuse in growth; lush. <i>She tossed her <b>luxuriant</b> dark hair.</i>
<b>mellowness</b>	Kindheartedness through maturity or old age. <i>A <b>mellowness</b> of light and shade not attainable in marble.</i>
<b>opulent</b>	Wealthy. <i>The <b>opulent</b> comfort of a limousine.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	An abundance. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a <b>plenitude</b> of wealth or food.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Plentiful. <i>A <b>plenteous</b> grape harvest.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Food is <b>plentiful</b>.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.
<b>plenty</b>	As much as necessary. <i>There was <b>plenty</b> of food for everyone.</i>
<b>profuse</b>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>I offered my <b>profuse</b> apologies.</i>
<b>profusion</b>	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The <b>profusion</b> of detail.</i>
<b>prosperity</b>	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>

Act as a server at the celebration of the Eucharist.
