adequate	About average; acceptable. <i>The food was adequate.</i>

ample	Affording an abundant supply. <i>There is ample time for discussion.</i>
amply	Sufficiently; more than adequately. <i>The evidence amply or fully confirms our suspicions.</i>
bountiful	Giving generously. <i>Bountiful compliments.</i>
bountifulness	The property of copious abundance.

bounty	A sum paid by the state to army or navy recruits on enlistment. <i>For millennia the people along the Nile have depended entirely on its bounty.</i>
copious	Large in number or quantity (especially of discourse). <i>She took copious notes.</i>
copiously	In large quantities. <i>His book is copiously annotated with references to the current debates.</i>
enough	An adequate quantity a quantity that is large enough to achieve a purpose. <i>Enough food.</i>
fecundation	Making fertile as by applying fertilizer or manure.
full	Make a garment fuller by pleating or gathering. <i>Full tones.</i>
galore	Existing in abundance. <i>Whiskey galore.</i>
lot	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>A lot of money.</i>
luxuriant	(of vegetation) rich and profuse in growth; lush. <i>She tossed her luxuriant dark hair.</i>
mellowness	Kindheartedness through maturity or old age. <i>A mellowness of light and shade not attainable in marble.</i>
opulent	Wealthy. <i>The opulent comfort of a limousine.</i>
plenitude	An abundance. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a plenitude of wealth or food.</i>
plenteous	Plentiful. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>
plentiful	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Food is plentiful.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
plenty	As much as necessary. <i>There was plenty of food for everyone.</i>
profuse	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>I offered my profuse apologies.</i>
profusion	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The profusion of detail.</i>
prosperity	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>

replete	Filled to satisfaction with food or drink. <i>It is replete with misery.</i>
serve	Act as a server at the celebration of the Eucharist. <i>The garage served to shelter his horses.</i>
