## Suffrage as a Noun

### Definitions of "Suffrage" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “suffrage” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A legal right guaranteed by the 15th amendment to the US Constitution; guaranteed to women by the 19th amendment.*
- *Intercessory prayers, especially those for the dead.*
- *The right to vote in political elections.*
- *A vote given in assent to a proposal or in favour of the election of a particular person.*
- *A series of petitions pronounced by the priest with the responses of the congregation.*
- *(in the Book of Common Prayer) the intercessory petitions pronounced by a priest in the Litany.*

### Synonyms of "Suffrage" as a noun (7 Words)

<b>ballot</b>	The total number of votes cast in a ballot. <i>He won 54 per cent of the <b>ballot</b>.</i>
<b>enfranchisement</b>	Liberation from imprisonment or slavery. <i>The World War hastened the <b>enfranchisement</b> of women.</i>

<b>franchise</b>	A business or service given a franchise to operate. <i>The <b>franchise</b> was limited to Estonian citizens.</i>
<b>right to vote</b>	The hand that is on the right side of the body.
<b>the vote</b>	A legal right guaranteed by the 15th amendment to the US Constitution; guaranteed to women by the 19th amendment.
<b>vote</b>	The total number of voters who participated. <i>There were only 17 <b>votes</b> in favor of the motion.</i>
<b>voting rights</b>	A choice that is made by counting the number of people in favor of each alternative.

## Associations of "Suffrage" (30 Words)

<b>abstain</b>	Formally decline to vote either for or against a proposal or motion. <i>She intends to <b>abstain</b> from sex before marriage.</i>
<b>abstention</b>	Restraint in one's consumption; abstinence. <i>A resolution passed by 126 votes to none with six <b>abstentions</b>.</i>
<b>autonomy</b>	(in Kantian moral philosophy) the capacity of an agent to act in accordance with objective morality rather than under the influence of desires. <i>Economic <b>autonomy</b> is still a long way off for many women.</i>
<b>ballot</b>	Vote by ballot. <i>Ambulance crews <b>balloted</b> unanimously to reject the deal.</i>
<b>candidate</b>	A politician who is running for public office. <i><b>Candidates</b> applying for this position should be computer literate.</i>
<b>choose</b>	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I ll stay as long as I <b>choose</b>.</i>
<b>chosen</b>	One who is the object of choice; who is given preference. <i>He is by no means a forerunner in his <b>chosen</b> field.</i>
<b>cloture</b>	Terminate debate by calling for a vote. <i>A <b>cloture</b> motion.</i>
<b>democracy</b>	A state governed under a system of democracy. <i>Demands for greater <b>democracy</b>.</i>

<b>democratic</b>	Representing or appealing to or adapted for the benefit of the people at large. <i><b>Democratic</b> art forms.</i>
<b>democratize</b>	Introduce democratic reforms; of nations. <i>Mass production has not <b>democratized</b> fashion.</i>
<b>disfranchise</b>	Deprive of voting rights.
<b>elect</b>	Selected as the best. <i>More people <b>elected</b> to work at home.</i>
<b>election</b>	A vote to select the winner of a position or political office. <i>The 1860 presidential <b>election</b>.</i>
<b>elective</b>	(of a course of study) chosen by the student rather than compulsory. <i>He had never held <b>elective</b> office.</i>
<b>elector</b>	In the US a member of the electoral college. <i>Close to 60 per cent of the 60 000 registered <b>electors</b> voted.</i>
<b>electorate</b>	The area represented by one Member of Parliament. <i>75 per cent of the <b>electorate</b> voted for a Scottish parliament in some form.</i>
<b>enfranchise</b>	Give (a town) the right to be represented in Parliament. <i>A proposal that foreigners should be <b>enfranchised</b> for local elections.</i>
<b>favour</b>	An inclination to approve. <i>I ve come to ask you a <b>favour</b>.</i>
<b>hustings</b>	A meeting at which candidates in an election address potential voters. <i>I was out on the <b>hustings</b> talking to people.</i>
<b>incoming</b>	Coming to settle in a country; immigrant. <i>An <b>incoming</b> call.</i>
<b>liberty</b>	The personification of liberty as a female figure. <i><b>Liberty</b> perfect <b>liberty</b> to think or feel or do just as one pleases.</i>
<b>plebiscite</b>	A law enacted by the plebeians' assembly. <i>The administration will hold a <b>plebiscite</b> for the approval of constitutional reforms.</i>
<b>poll</b>	Cut off the top of a tree or plant typically to encourage further growth pollard. <i>The country went to the <b>polls</b> on March 10.</i>
<b>president</b>	The elected head of a republican state. <i>The <b>president</b> of the European Union.</i>
<b>referendum</b>	A legislative act is referred for final approval to a popular vote by the electorate.

- responsive** Responding readily and with interest.  
*Children are often the quickest and most **responsive** members of the audience.*
- suffragette** A woman advocate of women's right to vote (especially a militant advocate in the United Kingdom at the beginning of the 20th century).
- vote** Express one's choice or preference by vote.  
*None of the Democrats **voted** last night.*
- voter** A citizen who has a legal right to vote.
