<b>indelicate</b>	In violation of good taste even verging on the indecent. <i>Forgive me asking an <b>indelicate</b> question but how are you off for money.</i>
<b>indicative</b>	Pointing out or revealing clearly. <i>Actions <b>indicative</b> of fear.</i>
<b>indicatory</b>	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly.
<b>juicy</b>	(of food) full of juice; succulent. <i>A <b>juicy</b> scandal.</i>
<b>lewd</b>	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a <b>lewd</b> song.</i>
<b>off colour</b>	Not performing or scheduled for duties.
<b>provocative</b>	Intended or intending to arouse sexual desire or interest. <i>A <b>provocative</b> remark.</i>
<b>prurient</b>	Characterized by lust. <i>She d been the subject of much <b>prurient</b> curiosity.</i>
<b>redolent</b>	(used with `of' or `with') noticeably odorous. <i>The hall was <b>redolent</b> of floor wax.</i>
<b>reminiscent</b>	Suggesting something by resemblance. <i>Her expression was wistful and <b>reminiscent</b>.</i>
<b>revelatory</b>	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly. <i>A <b>revelatory</b> experience.</i>
<b>ribald</b>	Referring to sexual matters in an amusingly coarse or irreverent way. <i>A <b>ribald</b> comment.</i>
<b>risqué</b>	Suggestive of sexual impropriety.
<b>salacious</b>	Suggestive of or tending to moral looseness. <i><b>Salacious</b> limericks.</i>
<b>significant</b>	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly.
<b>titillating</b>	Exciting by touching lightly so as to cause laughter or twitching movements. <i>She let slip <b>titillating</b> details about her clients.</i>
<b>unseemly</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An <b>unseemly</b> squabble.</i>

<b><u>reminiscent</u></b>	Suggesting something by resemblance. <i>Her robes were vaguely <b>reminiscent</b> of military dress.</i>
<b><u>resonant</u></b>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>The sound of these instruments played in a <b>resonant</b> room is unforgettable.</i>
<b>revealing</b>	(of an item of clothing) allowing more of the wearer's body to be seen than is usual. <i>A <b>revealing</b> glance.</i>
<b>suffix</b>	Attach a suffix to. <i><b>Suffix</b> words.</i>
<b>telltale</b>	Disclosing unintentionally. <i>A <b>telltale</b> panel of lights.</i>
