indelicate	In violation of good taste even verging on the indecent. <i>Forgive me asking an indelicate question but how are you off for money.</i>
indicative	Pointing out or revealing clearly. <i>Actions indicative of fear.</i>
indicatory	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly.
juicy	(of food) full of juice; succulent. <i>A juicy scandal.</i>
lewd	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a lewd song.</i>
off colour	Not performing or scheduled for duties.
provocative	Intended or intending to arouse sexual desire or interest. <i>A provocative remark.</i>
prurient	Characterized by lust. <i>She d been the subject of much prurient curiosity.</i>
redolent	(used with `of' or `with') noticeably odorous. <i>The hall was redolent of floor wax.</i>
reminiscent	Suggesting something by resemblance. <i>Her expression was wistful and reminiscent.</i>
revelatory	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly. <i>A revelatory experience.</i>
ribald	Referring to sexual matters in an amusingly coarse or irreverent way. <i>A ribald comment.</i>
risqué	Suggestive of sexual impropriety.
salacious	Suggestive of or tending to moral looseness. <i>Salacious limericks.</i>
significant	(usually followed by `of') pointing out or revealing clearly.
titillating	Exciting by touching lightly so as to cause laughter or twitching movements. <i>She let slip titillating details about her clients.</i>
unseemly	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An unseemly squabble.</i>

revealing	(of an item of clothing) allowing more of the wearer's body to be seen than is usual. <i>A revealing glance.</i>
suffix	Attach a suffix to. <i>Suffix words.</i>
telltale	Disclosing unintentionally. <i>A telltale panel of lights.</i>
verb	Use a word that is not conventionally used as a verb typically a noun as a verb. <i>Any English noun can be verbed but some are more resistant than others.</i>
word	A word is a string of bits stored in computer memory. <i>He forgot the password.</i>
