<b>marshal</b>	Combine (coats of arms) to indicate marriage, descent, or the bearing of office. <i><b>Marshal</b> resources.</i>
<b>mobilise</b>	Get ready for war.

<b><u>mobilize</u></b>	Organize and encourage (a group of people) to take collective action in pursuit of a particular objective. <i>It would be hard for worker representatives to <b>mobilize</b> the workforce against the employers.</i>
<b>muster</b>	Collect or assemble (a number or amount). <i><b>Muster</b> the courage to do something.</i>
<b>muster up</b>	Call to duty, military service, jury duty, etc.
<b>order</b>	Place in a certain order. <i>Are you ready to <b>order</b> sir.</i>
<b><u>provoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Rachel refused to be <b>provoked</b>.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise the level or amount of something. <i>They <b>raised</b> pigs and kept a pony.</i>
<b><u>rally</u></b>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to <b>rally</b> support for the union.</i>
<b>recall</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>Students can <b>recall</b> templates or stored formats.</i>

<b>revive</b>	Restore to life or consciousness. <i>Many pagan traditions are being <b>revived</b>.</i>

<b>request</b>	A tune or song played on a radio programme typically accompanied by a personal message in response to a listener's request. <i>She <b>requested</b> an extra bed in her room.</i>
<b>sergeant</b>	A lawman with the rank of sergeant.
<b>subpoena</b>	Serve or summon with a subpoena. <i>The decision to <b>subpoena</b> government records.</i>
<b>summons</b>	Serve someone with a summons. <i>They might receive a <b>summons</b> to fly to France next day.</i>
<b>troop</b>	(of a group of people) come or go together or in large numbers. <i><b>Troop</b> cuts.</i>
<b>warrant</b>	Stand behind and guarantee the quality, accuracy, or condition of. <i>I <b>warrant</b> this information.</i>
