- done for** Cooked until ready to serve.
- ruined** Doomed to extinction.
*A **ruined** castle.*
- undone** Not done or finished.
*Her blouse had come **undone** at the neck.*
- washed-up** Doomed to extinction.



Associations of "Sunk" (30 Words)

- abate** (of something unpleasant or severe) become less intense or widespread.
*The storm **abated**.*
- absorb** Take up, as of debts or payments.
*The liquids light and gases **absorb**.*

allay	Lessen the intensity of or calm. <i>Some stale figs partly allayed our hunger.</i>
alleviate	Make easier. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only alleviate it.</i>
awash	Level with the surface of water so that it just washes over. <i>The boat rolled violently her decks awash.</i>
descend	(of sound) become lower in pitch. <i>A side road descended into the forest.</i>
diminish	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. <i>The new law is expected to diminish the government's chances.</i>
dip	Dip into a liquid. <i>I had to dip into my savings to buy him this present.</i>
dive	A headlong plunge into water. <i>The jumbo jet went into a dive.</i>
drop	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>Don't drop the dishes.</i>
ebb	Hem in fish with stakes and nets so as to prevent them from going back into the sea with the ebb. <i>The tide was on the ebb.</i>
engulf	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>Europe might be engulfed by war.</i>
fall	Fall or flow in a certain way. <i>In October came the first fall of snow.</i>
flooded	Covered with water. <i>A flooded bathroom.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>Immerse the paper in water for twenty minutes.</i>
lessen	Make smaller. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
mitigate	Make less severe or harsh. <i>There had been a provocation that mitigated the offence to a degree.</i>
overwhelm	Have a strong emotional effect on. <i>Floodwaters overwhelmed hundreds of houses.</i>
palliate	Make (a disease or its symptoms) less severe without removing the cause. <i>This eliminated or at least palliated suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>

<u>plunge</u>	An act of jumping or diving into water. <i>To peel fruit cover with boiling water and then plunge them into iced water.</i>
<u>quench</u>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>Quench the flames.</i>
reduced	Made less in size or amount or degree.
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He relieved her of her baggage.</i>
slake	Cause to heat and crumble by treatment with water. <i>Slake the lime within a day or two of purchase.</i>
slump	Assume a drooping posture or carriage. <i>Denis was slumped in his seat.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Fill or cover completely, usually with water. <i>The U boat had had time to submerge.</i>
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
submerse	Put under water. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i>
subside	Become less intense, violent, or severe. <i>The pain subsided.</i>
<u>under</u>	Under water. <i>See under for further discussion.</i>
