*An **animated** conversation.*
- blithe** Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
*Spoke with **blithe** ignorance of the true situation.*
- bright** Not made dim or less bright.
*All the world seems **bright** and gay.*
- brilliant** Exceptionally clever or talented.
*He was quite **brilliant** and was promoted almost at once.*
- bubbly** Full of or showing high spirits.
*A bright and **bubbly** personality.*
- buoyant** Able or tending to keep afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or gas.
***Buoyant** balsawood boats.*
- cheerful** Noticeably happy and optimistic.
*A **cheerful** voice.*

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| cheery | Happy and optimistic. <i>A cheery smile.</i> |
| clear | Clear and distinct to the senses easily perceptible. <i>It was clear that they were in a trap.</i> |
| ebullient | Joyously unrestrained. <i>She sounded ebullient and happy.</i> |
| fair | Having few alterations or corrections. <i>A fair complexion.</i> |
| fine | Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>The fine hand of a master.</i> |
| glad | Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>He will be glad to carry your bags.</i> |
| happy | Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>Happy Christmas.</i> |
| jolly | Lively and entertaining. <i>The jolly crowd at the reunion.</i> |
| jovial | Cheerful and friendly. <i>She was in a jovial mood.</i> |
| joyful | Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>Make a joyful noise.</i> |
| light-hearted | Carefree and happy and lighthearted. |
| merry | Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>The streets were dense with merry throngs of students.</i> |
| perky | Cheerful and lively. <i>Don't be perky miss.</i> |
| rosy | Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>The memory had the power to make her cheeks turn rosy.</i> |
| sparky | Lively and high-spirited. <i>Her sparky personality.</i> |
| sunlit | Illuminated by direct light from the sun. <i>The sunlit slopes of the canyon.</i> |
| upbeat | Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>He was upbeat about the company's future.</i> |
| vivacious | Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman). <i>Her vivacious and elegant mother.</i> |

- afternoon** In the afternoon every afternoon.
*She worked on Tuesday **afternoons**.*
- auroral** Characteristic of the dawn.
*A dim **auroral** glow.*
- breakfast** Eat breakfast.
*We **breakfast** at seven.*
- bright** Brightly.
*A choice of colours from pastels through to **brights**.*
- dawn** Become evident to the mind; be perceived or understood.
*The awful truth was beginning to **dawn** on him.*
- day** The part of a day when it is light the time between sunrise and sunset.
*They only met a few **days** ago.*

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| daybreak | The first light of day. <i>She set off at daybreak.</i> |
| daylight | The natural light of the day. <i>There were two hours of daylight left.</i> |
| daytime | The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside. <i>A daytime telephone number.</i> |
| glow | Emit a steady even light without flames. <i>With a glow of pride Mildred walked away.</i> |
| hour | A time of day specified as an exact number of hours from midnight or midday. <i>We live an hour from the airport.</i> |
| illuminant | Something that can serve as a source of light. <i>Until 1880 oil was the only illuminant in use.</i> |
| lunch | Eat lunch. <i>At what time are you lunching.</i> |
| lunchtime | The customary or habitual hour for eating lunch. <i>He observed a regular lunchtime.</i> |
| midday | The middle of the day. <i>The midday sun.</i> |
| midnight | Twelve o'clock at night. <i>The midnight hours.</i> |
| moon | Any object resembling a moon. <i>Jupiter has sixteen moons.</i> |
| morning | Every morning. <i>I ve got a meeting this morning.</i> |
| noon | Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve noon.</i> |
| o'clock | According to the clock. |
| solstice | The time or date (twice each year) at which the sun reaches its maximum or minimum declination, marked by the longest and shortest days (about 21 June and 22 December). |
| summer | Spend the summer in a particular place. <i>This plant flowers in late summer.</i> |
| sun | The rays of the sun. <i>After going so many suns without food I was sleeping.</i> |
| sunday | United States evangelist (1862-1935). |
| sunlight | The rays of the sun. <i>A shaft of sunlight.</i> |

sunrise The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives.
*A spectacular **sunrise** over the summit of the mountain.*

sunshine Used as a friendly or sometimes threatening form of address.
*Hand it over **sunshine**.*

tonight The evening or night of the present day.
*Are you doing anything **tonight**.*

wednesday The fourth day of the week; the third working day.

weekday Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday).
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
