<b>blithe</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Spoke with <b>blithe</b> ignorance of the true situation.</i>
<b>bright</b>	Not made dim or less bright. <i>All the world seems <b>bright</b> and gay.</i>
<b>brilliant</b>	Exceptionally clever or talented. <i>He was quite <b>brilliant</b> and was promoted almost at once.</i>
<b>bubbly</b>	Full of or showing high spirits. <i>A bright and <b>bubbly</b> personality.</i>
<b>buoyant</b>	Able or tending to keep afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or gas. <i><b>Buoyant</b> balsawood boats.</i>
<b>cheerful</b>	Noticeably happy and optimistic. <i>A <b>cheerful</b> voice.</i>

<b>cheery</b>	Happy and optimistic. <i>A <b>cheery</b> smile.</i>
<b>clear</b>	Clear and distinct to the senses easily perceptible. <i>It was <b>clear</b> that they were in a trap.</i>
<b>ebullient</b>	Joyously unrestrained. <i>She sounded <b>ebullient</b> and happy.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Having few alterations or corrections. <i>A <b>fair</b> complexion.</i>
<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>The <b>fine</b> hand of a master.</i>
<b>glad</b>	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>He will be <b>glad</b> to carry your bags.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i><b>Happy</b> Christmas.</i>
<b>jolly</b>	Lively and entertaining. <i>The <b>jolly</b> crowd at the reunion.</i>
<b>jovial</b>	Cheerful and friendly. <i>She was in a <b>jovial</b> mood.</i>
<b>joyful</b>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>Make a <b>joyful</b> noise.</i>
<b>light-hearted</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
<b>merry</b>	Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>The streets were dense with <b>merry</b> throngs of students.</i>
<b>perky</b>	Cheerful and lively. <i>Don t be <b>perky</b> miss.</i>
<b>rosy</b>	Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>The memory had the power to make her cheeks turn <b>rosy</b>.</i>
<b>sparky</b>	Lively and high-spirited. <i>Her <b>sparky</b> personality.</i>
<b>sunlit</b>	Illuminated by direct light from the sun. <i>The <b>sunlit</b> slopes of the canyon.</i>
<b>upbeat</b>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>He was <b>upbeat</b> about the company s future.</i>
<b>vivacious</b>	Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman). <i>Her <b>vivacious</b> and elegant mother.</i>

<b>afternoon</b>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>She worked on Tuesday <b>afternoons</b>.</i>
<b>auroral</b>	Characteristic of the dawn. <i>A dim <b>auroral</b> glow.</i>
<b>breakfast</b>	Eat breakfast. <i>We <b>breakfast</b> at seven.</i>
<b>bright</b>	Brightly. <i>A choice of colours from pastels through to <b>brights</b>.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	Become evident to the mind; be perceived or understood. <i>The awful truth was beginning to <b>dawn</b> on him.</i>
<b>day</b>	The part of a day when it is light the time between sunrise and sunset. <i>They only met a few <b>days</b> ago.</i>



<b>daybreak</b>	The first light of day. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>
<b>daylight</b>	The natural light of the day. <i>There were two hours of <b>daylight</b> left.</i>
<b>daytime</b>	The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside. <i>A <b>daytime</b> telephone number.</i>
<b>glow</b>	Emit a steady even light without flames. <i>With a <b>glow</b> of pride Mildred walked away.</i>
<b>hour</b>	A time of day specified as an exact number of hours from midnight or midday. <i>We live an <b>hour</b> from the airport.</i>
<b>illuminant</b>	Something that can serve as a source of light. <i>Until 1880 oil was the only <b>illuminant</b> in use.</i>
<b>lunch</b>	Eat lunch. <i>At what time are you <b>lunching</b>.</i>
<b>lunchtime</b>	The customary or habitual hour for eating lunch. <i>He observed a regular <b>lunchtime</b>.</i>
<b>midday</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The <b>midday</b> sun.</i>
<b>midnight</b>	Twelve o'clock at night. <i>The <b>midnight</b> hours.</i>
<b>moon</b>	Any object resembling a moon. <i>Jupiter has sixteen <b>moons</b>.</i>
<b>morning</b>	Every morning. <i>I ve got a meeting this <b>morning</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>solstice</b>	The time or date (twice each year) at which the sun reaches its maximum or minimum declination, marked by the longest and shortest days (about 21 June and 22 December).
<b>summer</b>	Spend the summer in a particular place. <i>This plant flowers in late <b>summer</b>.</i>
<b>sun</b>	The rays of the sun. <i>After going so many <b>suns</b> without food I was sleeping.</i>
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<b>sunlight</b>	The rays of the sun. <i>A shaft of <b>sunlight</b>.</i>

**sunrise** The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives.  
*A spectacular **sunrise** over the summit of the mountain.*

**sunshine** Used as a friendly or sometimes threatening form of address.  
*Hand it over **sunshine**.*

**tonight** The evening or night of the present day.  
*Are you doing anything **tonight**.*

**wednesday** The fourth day of the week; the third working day.

**weekday** Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday).  
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
