## Sunrise as a Noun

### Definitions of "Sunrise" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sunrise” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The daily event of the sun rising above the horizon.*
- *Atmospheric phenomena accompanying the daily appearance of the sun.*
- *The colours and light visible in the sky on an occasion of the sun's first appearance in the morning, considered as a view or spectacle.*
- *The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives.*
- *The first light of day.*



## Synonyms of "Sunrise" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>aurora</b>	A natural electrical phenomenon characterized by the appearance of streamers of reddish or greenish light in the sky especially near the northern or southern magnetic pole The effect is caused by the interaction of charged particles from the sun with atoms in the upper atmosphere In northern and southern regions it is respectively called aurora borealis or Northern Lights and aurora australis or Southern Lights.
<b>break of day</b>	The occurrence of breaking.
<b>break of the day</b>	A crack in the earth's crust resulting from the displacement of one side with respect to the other.
<b>cockcrow</b>	Dawn. <i>She helped him to dance until <b>cockcrow</b>.</i>
<b>crack of dawn</b>	A sudden sharp noise.

<b>dawn</b>	The first light of day. <i>He set off at <b>dawn</b>.</i>
<b>dawning</b>	An opening time period. <i>The <b>dawnings</b> of civilization.</i>
<b>daybreak</b>	The first light of day. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>
<b>dayspring</b>	Dawn.
<b>first light</b>	The lowest forward gear ratio in the gear box of a motor vehicle; used to start a car moving.
<b>first thing in the morning</b>	The lowest forward gear ratio in the gear box of a motor vehicle; used to start a car moving.
<b><u>morning</u></b>	The period of time between midnight and noon, especially from sunrise to noon. <i>A hint of steely light showed that <b>morning</b> was on its way.</i>
<b>sunup</b>	The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives. <i>They worked from <b>sunup</b> to sundown.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Sunrise" as a noun

- *A spectacular sunrise over the summit of the mountain.*

<b>daylight</b>	Light during the daytime. <i>I returned at <b>daylight</b>.</i>
<b>dew</b>	A beaded or glistening liquid resembling dew. <i>Sweat <b>dewed</b> her lashes.</i>
<b>evening</b>	Prescribed by fashion as suitable for relatively formal social events held in the evening. <i>Some pubs hold Irish music <b>evenings</b>.</i>
<b>fortnight</b>	A period of fourteen consecutive days. <i>Most major tennis tournaments last a <b>fortnight</b>.</i>
<b>friday</b>	The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day.
<b>midnight</b>	12 o'clock at night; the middle of the night. <i>The <b>midnight</b> hours.</i>
<b>monday</b>	The second day of the week; the first working day.
<b>morning</b>	Every morning. <i>They talked until <b>morning</b>.</i>
<b>nightfall</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>saturday</b>	The seventh and last day of the week; observed as the Sabbath by Jews and some Christians.
<b>sunday</b>	First day of the week; observed as a day of rest and worship by most Christians.
<b>sunny</b>	(of a place) receiving much sunlight. <i>He had a <b>sunny</b> disposition.</i>
<b>thursday</b>	The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.
<b>tomorrow</b>	The next day, the day after, following the present day. <i>Today's engineers are <b>tomorrow</b>'s buyers.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>Please <b>wake</b> me at 6 AM.</i>
<b>waking</b>	Marked by full consciousness or alertness. <i>Days of danger and nights of <b>waking</b>.</i>
<b>wednesday</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.

- week** Hours or days of work in a calendar week.  
*She works a 48 hour **week**.*
- weekday** Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday).  
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
- weekend** Spend the weekend.  
*I went to see the film at the **weekend**.*
- yesterday** In the recent past.  
*We shared many **yesterdays**.*
