- *Appearing to be true or real only until examined more closely.*
- *Occurring on or near the surface of the skin.*
- *Existing or occurring at or on the surface.*
- *Of, affecting, or being on or near the surface.*
- *Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough.*
- *Not thorough, deep, or complete; cursory.*
- *Of little substance or significance.*
- *Denoting a quantity of a material expressed in terms of area covered rather than linear dimension or volume.*
- *Situated or occurring on the skin or immediately beneath it.*
- *Lacking depth of character or understanding.*
- *Concerned with or comprehending only what is apparent or obvious; not deep or*

penetrating emotionally or intellectually.

<u>external</u>	Purely outward or superficial- A.R.Gurney,Jr. <i>The external walls.</i>
<u>facile</u>	(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach. <i>A man of facile and shallow intellect.</i>
fatuous	Silly and pointless. <i>A fatuous comment.</i>
flippant	Not showing a serious or respectful attitude. <i>A flippant remark.</i>
frivolous	Not having any serious purpose or value. <i>The frivolous fun loving flappers of the twenties.</i>
<u>glib</u>	Having only superficial plausibility. <i>A glib response to a complex question.</i>
<u>imperfect</u>	(of a gift, title, etc.) transferred without all the necessary conditions or requirements being met. <i>An imperfect grasp of English.</i>
<u>inadequate</u>	Lacking the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task. <i>A sad solitary inadequate man.</i>

inane	Devoid of intelligence. <i>Don't badger people with inane questions.</i>
<u>minimal</u>	Characterized by the repetition and gradual alteration of short phrases. <i>A minimal charge for the service.</i>
offhand	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>She treated most men with offhand contempt.</i>
on the surface	On the surface.
<u>ostensible</u>	Represented or appearing as such; pretended. <i>His ostensible purpose was charity his real goal popularity.</i>
outer	Further from the centre or inside. <i>Outer reality.</i>
outermost	Situated at the farthest possible point from a center. <i>The outermost layer of the earth.</i>
<u>outside</u>	Leading to or from the outside. <i>An outside chance.</i>
outward	Relating to the external appearance of something rather than its true nature. <i>An outward journey.</i>
passing	Going past. <i>She detested him more with every passing second.</i>
<u>perfunctory</u>	(of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort. <i>Perfunctory courtesy.</i>
peripheral	Relating to or situated on the edge or periphery of something. <i>Peripheral suburbs.</i>
<u>seeming</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>An angry seeming man.</i>
<u>shallow</u>	Varying only slightly from a specified or understood line or direction, especially the horizontal. <i>Being fairly shallow the water was warm.</i>
silly	Helpless; defenceless (typically used of a woman, child, or animal). <i>His mother worried herself silly over him.</i>
<u>sketchy</u>	(of a picture) resembling a sketch; consisting of outline without much detail. <i>A sketchy pencil drawing by Toulouse Lautrec.</i>
skin-deep	Penetrating no deeper than the skin.
slapdash	Done too hurriedly and carelessly. <i>Slapdash work.</i>

slight	Small in degree; inconsiderable. <i>There s a slight chance it will work.</i>
slipshod	Marked by great carelessness. <i>Slipshod spelling.</i>
specious	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>A specious argument.</i>
surface	Relating to or found on the surface of something. <i>Surface mail.</i>
thoughtless	Showing lack of careful thought. <i>To think a few minutes of thoughtless pleasure could end in this.</i>
token	Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. <i>A tokenish gesture.</i>
trivial	Concerned with trivialities. <i>A trivial young woman.</i>
unconsidered	Without proper consideration or reflection. <i>Unconsidered words.</i>

fustian	Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours. <i>A smokescreen of fustian and fantasy.</i>
grandiloquent	Lofty in style. <i>A grandiloquent and boastful manner.</i>
guise	An external form, appearance, or manner of presentation, typically concealing the true nature of something. <i>He visited in the guise of an inspector.</i>
integument	A tough outer protective layer, especially that of an animal or plant. <i>This chemical compound is found in the integument of the seed.</i>
meretricious	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>Meretricious souvenirs for the tourist trade.</i>
ostensible	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>His ostensible purpose was charity his real goal popularity.</i>

outer	A shot that strikes the outer. <i>The outer layer of the skin.</i>
outward	Outwards. <i>The outward voyage.</i>
<u>outwardly</u>	In outward appearance. <i>Outwardly the figure is smooth.</i>
pompous	Puffed up with vanity. <i>A pompous speech.</i>
pretentious	(of a display) tawdry or vulgar. <i>The pretentious jargon of wine experts.</i>
putative	Generally considered or reputed to be. <i>The foundling's putative father.</i>
<u>rant</u>	A spell of ranting a tirade. <i>She was still ranting on about the unfairness of it all.</i>
rind	The hard outer edge of cheese or bacon. <i>When the meat ran out they had to rind trees and chew the inner bark for nourishment.</i>
<u>seeming</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>An angry seeming man.</i>
<u>semblance</u>	Resemblance similarity. <i>She tried to force her thoughts back into some semblance of order.</i>
<u>shallow</u>	Become shallow. <i>The lake shallowed over time.</i>
smatter	To talk foolishly. <i>She smatters Russian.</i>
<u>surface</u>	Put a coat on cover the surface of furnish with a surface. <i>The cloth had a pattern of red dots on a white surface.</i>
