### Definitions of "Superficial" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "superficial" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Appearing to be true or real only until examined more closely.
- Occurring on or near the surface of the skin.
- Existing or occurring at or on the surface.
- Of, affecting, or being on or near the surface.
- Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough.
- Not thorough, deep, or complete; cursory.
- Of little substance or significance.
- Denoting a quantity of a material expressed in terms of area covered rather than linear dimension or volume.
- Situated or occurring on the skin or immediately beneath it.
- Lacking depth of character or understanding.
- Concerned with or comprehending only what is apparent or obvious; not deep or



penetrating emotionally or intellectually.

cosmetic	Serving to improve the appearance of the body, especially the face. <i>Cosmetic surgery.</i>
cursory	Hasty and therefore not thorough or detailed. A casual or <b>cursory</b> inspection failed to reveal the house s structural flaws.
desultory	Occurring randomly or occasionally. A few people were left dancing in a <b>desultory</b> fashion.
empty-headed	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity.
<u>exterior</u>	Forming, situated on, or relating to the outside of something. <i>Exterior</i> noise.
<u>external</u>	Purely outward or superficial- A.R.Gurney,Jr. <i>The <b>external</b> walls.</i>
<u>facile</u>	(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach. <i>A man of facile and shallow intellect.</i>
fatuous	Silly and pointless. A <b>fatuous</b> comment.
flippant	Not showing a serious or respectful attitude. A <b>flippant</b> remark.
frivolous	Not having any serious purpose or value. The <b>frivolous</b> fun loving flappers of the twenties.
<u>glib</u>	Having only superficial plausibility. A <b>glib</b> response to a complex question.
<u>imperfect</u>	(of a gift, title, etc.) transferred without all the necessary conditions or requirements being met. An <b>imperfect</b> grasp of English.
<u>inadequate</u>	Lacking the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task. A sad solitary <b>inadequate</b> man.



inane	Devoid of intelligence. Don t badger people with <b>inane</b> questions.
<u>minimal</u>	Characterized by the repetition and gradual alteration of short phrases. A <i>minimal</i> charge for the service.
offhand	With little or no preparation or forethought. She treated most men with <b>offhand</b> contempt.
on the surface	On the surface.
<u>ostensible</u>	Represented or appearing as such; pretended. His <b>ostensible</b> purpose was charity his real goal popularity.
outer	Further from the centre or inside. <i>Outer reality</i> .
outermost	Situated at the farthest possible point from a center. The <b>outermost</b> layer of the earth.
<u>outside</u>	Leading to or from the outside. An <b>outside</b> chance.
outward	Relating to the external appearance of something rather than its true nature. An <b>outward</b> journey.
passing	Going past. She detested him more with every <b>passing</b> second.
<u>perfunctory</u>	(of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort. <i>Perfunctory</i> courtesy.
peripheral	Relating to or situated on the edge or periphery of something. <i>Peripheral</i> suburbs.
<u>seeming</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. An angry <b>seeming</b> man.
<u>shallow</u>	Varying only slightly from a specified or understood line or direction, especially the horizontal. Being fairly <b>shallow</b> the water was warm.
silly	Helpless; defenceless (typically used of a woman, child, or animal). <i>His mother worried herself</i> <b>silly</b> over him.
<u>sketchy</u>	(of a picture) resembling a sketch; consisting of outline without much detail. A <b>sketchy</b> pencil drawing by Toulouse Lautrec.
skin-deep	Penetrating no deeper than the skin.
slapdash	Done too hurriedly and carelessly. <i>Slapdash</i> work.



slight	Small in degree; inconsiderable. There s a <b>slight</b> chance it will work.
slipshod	Marked by great carelessness. <i>Slipshod</i> spelling.
specious	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. A <b>specious</b> argument.
<u>surface</u>	Relating to or found on the surface of something. <i>Surface</i> mail.
thoughtless	Showing lack of careful thought. To think a few minutes of <b>thoughtless</b> pleasure could end in this.
<u>token</u>	Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. A <b>token</b> ish gesture.
<u>trivial</u>	Concerned with trivialities. A <b>trivial</b> young woman.
unconsidered	Without proper consideration or reflection. <i>Unconsidered</i> words.

bluster	Show off. You threaten and <b>bluster</b> but won t carry it through.
bombast	Pompous or pretentious talk or writing. The <b>bombast</b> of gung ho militarism.
dabbler	Any of numerous shallow-water ducks that feed by upending and dabbling.
dilettante	An amateur who engages in an activity without serious intentions and who pretends to have knowledge. <i>A wealthy literary dilettante</i> .
epidermis	The outer layer of the skin covering the exterior body surface of vertebrates.
exaggeration	Extravagant exaggeration. <i>He was prone to <b>exaggeration</b>.</i>
<u>external</u>	Coming or derived from a source outside the subject affected. <i>For external application only.</i>
externalize	Regard as objective. Such neuroses are <b>externalize</b> d as interpersonal conflicts.
fustian	Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours. A smokescreen of <b>fustian</b> and fantasy.
grandiloquent	Lofty in style. A <b>grandiloquent</b> and boastful manner.
<u>guise</u>	An external form, appearance, or manner of presentation, typically concealing the true nature of something. <i>He visited in the <b>guise</b> of an inspector.</i>
integument	A tough outer protective layer, especially that of an animal or plant. This chemical compound is found in the <b>integument</b> of the seed.
meretricious	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>Meretricious</i> souvenirs for the tourist trade.
<u>ostensible</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. His <b>ostensible</b> purpose was charity his real goal popularity.



outer	A shot that strikes the outer. The <b>outer</b> layer of the skin.
outward	Outwards. The <b>outward</b> voyage.
<u>outwardly</u>	In outward appearance. <i>Outwardly</i> the figure is smooth.
pompous	Puffed up with vanity. A <b>pompous</b> speech.
pretentious	(of a display) tawdry or vulgar. The <b>pretentious</b> jargon of wine experts.
putative	Generally considered or reputed to be. <i>The foundling s <b>putative</b> father.</i>
<u>rant</u>	A spell of ranting a tirade. She was still <b>rant</b> ing on about the unfairness of it all.
rind	The hard outer edge of cheese or bacon. When the meat ran out they had to <b>rind</b> trees and chew the inner bark for nourishment.
<u>seeming</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. An angry <b>seeming</b> man.
<u>semblance</u>	Resemblance similarity. She tried to force her thoughts back into some <b>semblance</b> of order.
<u>shallow</u>	Become shallow. The lake <b>shallow</b> ed over time.
smatter	To talk foolishly. She <b>smatter</b> s Russian.
<u>surface</u>	Put a coat on cover the surface of furnish with a surface. The cloth had a pattern of red dots on a white <b>surface</b> .
