<b>primacy</b>	The office, period of office, or authority of a primate of the Church. <i>London s <b>primacy</b> as a financial centre.</i>
<b>supremacy</b>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<b>transcendence</b>	The state of excelling or surpassing or going beyond usual limits. <i>The possibility of spiritual <b>transcendence</b> in the modern world.</i>
<b>transcendency</b>	A state of being or existence above and beyond the limits of material experience.
<b>whip hand</b>	A quick blow delivered with a whip or whiplike object.

<b>excellence</b>	An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>A center of manufacturing <b>excellence</b>.</i>
<b>exceptional</b>	Unusual; not typical. <i>Late claims will only be accepted in <b>exceptional</b> circumstances.</i>

<b>impeccable</b>	Not liable to sin. <i>Speaks <b>impeccable</b> French.</i>
<b>innately</b>	In an innate manner. <i>He says females are <b>innately</b> predisposed to learn about people and their emotions.</i>

<b>merit</b>	The quality of being deserving (e.g., deserving assistance). <i>Composers of outstanding <b>merit</b>.</i>

<b>moral</b>	Standards of behaviour; principles of right and wrong. <i>He is a caring <b>moral</b> man.</i>
<b><u>perfection</u></b>	The action or process of improving something until it is faultless. <i>His pursuit of golfing <b>perfection</b>.</i>
<b>preeminence</b>	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
<b>superb</b>	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e.g superb lyrebird. <i>A <b>superb</b> meal.</i>
<b>supreme</b>	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>Our comrades who made the <b>supreme</b> sacrifice.</i>
<b>surpassing</b>	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of <b>surpassing</b> beauty.</i>
<b>technological</b>	Based in scientific and industrial progress. <i><b>Technological</b> development.</i>
<b>terrific</b>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>Fought a <b>terrific</b> battle.</i>
<b><u>unsurpassed</u></b>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
<b>vacuity</b>	The absence of matter. <i>He denounced what he considered the frivolity or <b>vacuity</b> of much contemporary painting.</i>
<b>virtue</b>	The quality of doing what is right and avoiding what is wrong. <i>There s no <b>virtue</b> in suffering in silence.</i>
