ascendancy	Occupation of a position of dominant power or influence. <i>The ascendancy of good over evil.</i>
better quality	Something superior in quality or condition or effect.
<u>dominance</u>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>Her apparent dominance of her husband was really her attempt to make him pay attention to her.</i>
edge	A slight competitive advantage. <i>He rounded the edges of the box.</i>
high quality	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.

lead	A position of being the initiator of something and an example that others will follow especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>A good lead for a job.</i>
leadership	The status of a leader. <i>The leadership was divided into two camps.</i>
precedence	The order to be ceremonially observed by people of different rank, according to an acknowledged or legally determined system. <i>Its precedence as the world's leading manufacturer of pharmaceuticals.</i>
primacy	The office, period of office, or authority of a primate of the Church. <i>London's primacy as a financial centre.</i>
supremacy	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The supremacy of the king.</i>
transcendence	The state of excelling or surpassing or going beyond usual limits. <i>The possibility of spiritual transcendence in the modern world.</i>
transcendancy	A state of being or existence above and beyond the limits of material experience.
whip hand	A quick blow delivered with a whip or whiplike object.

ethic	Relating to moral principles or the branch of knowledge dealing with these. <i>The ethic question is of wider import.</i>
ethics	The philosophical study of moral values and rules. <i>Many scientists question the ethics of cruel experiments.</i>
excellence	An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>A center of manufacturing excellence.</i>
exceptional	Unusual; not typical. <i>Late claims will only be accepted in exceptional circumstances.</i>
<u>exemplar</u>	Something to be imitated. <i>The place is an exemplar of multicultural Britain.</i>
<u>exemplify</u>	Clarify by giving an example of. <i>He exemplified his point with an anecdote.</i>
<u>flawless</u>	Without a flaw. <i>A flawless gemstone.</i>
greatness	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence. <i>Elgar's greatness as a composer.</i>
impeccable	Not liable to sin. <i>Speaks impeccable French.</i>
innately	In an innate manner. <i>He says females are innately predisposed to learn about people and their emotions.</i>
<u>intellectual</u>	Of or associated with or requiring the use of the mind. <i>Satire is an intellectual weapon.</i>
<u>majesty</u>	Royal power. <i>The majesty of Ben Nevis.</i>
merit	The quality of being deserving (e.g., deserving assistance). <i>Composers of outstanding merit.</i>

moral	Standards of behaviour; principles of right and wrong. <i>He is a caring moral man.</i>
<u>perfection</u>	The action or process of improving something until it is faultless. <i>His pursuit of golfing perfection.</i>
preeminence	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
superb	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e g superb lyrebird. <i>A superb meal.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>Our comrades who made the supreme sacrifice.</i>
surpassing	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of surpassing beauty.</i>
technological	Based in scientific and industrial progress. <i>Technological development.</i>
terrific	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>Fought a terrific battle.</i>
<u>unsurpassed</u>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i>
vacuity	The absence of matter. <i>He denounced what he considered the frivolity or vacuity of much contemporary painting.</i>
virtue	The quality of doing what is right and avoiding what is wrong. <i>There s no virtue in suffering in silence.</i>
