Synonyms of "Superstitious" as an adjective (8 Words)

credulous	Disposed to believe on little evidence. <i>The gimmick would convince none but the most credulous.</i>
groundless	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Your fears are quite groundless.</i>
illusory	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>Secret activities offer presidents the alluring but often illusory promise that they can achieve foreign policy goals without the bothersome debate and open decision that are staples of democracy.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>
<u>mythical</u>	Idealized, especially with reference to the past. <i>One of Denmark s greatest mythical heroes.</i>
prone to superstition	Having a tendency (to); often used in combination.
<u>unfounded</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Unfounded suspicions.</i>
unprovable	Unable to be demonstrated by evidence or argument as true or existing. <i>The hypothesis is not merely unprovable but false.</i>

Associations of "Superstitious" (30 Words)

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The allegations are patently absurd.</i>
absurdity	A message whose content is at variance with reason. <i>The crowd laughed at the absurdity of the clown's behavior.</i>
belief	A vague idea in which some confidence is placed. <i>It strengthened my belief in his sincerity.</i>
<u>faith</u>	Strong belief in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual conviction rather than proof. <i>He cherished the faith of a good woman.</i>
fatuity	A ludicrous folly.

foolish	Devoid of good sense or judgment. <i>He was foolish enough to confide in her.</i>
gibberish	Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks gibberish.</i>
goofy	Having or displaying protruding or crooked front teeth. <i>Wore a goofy hat.</i>
idolatrous	Blindly or excessively devoted or adoring. <i>Idolatrous religions.</i>
illogical	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
impolitic	Not politic. <i>It was impolitic to pay the slightest tribute to the enemy.</i>
inadvisable	Not prudent or wise; not recommended. <i>Running on the ice is inadvisable.</i>
incoherent	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>The film is ideologically incoherent.</i>
inexpedient	Not practical, suitable, or advisable. <i>An inexpedient tactic.</i>
injudicious	Showing very poor judgement; unwise. <i>I took a few injudicious swigs of potent cider.</i>
irrational	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational animals.</i>
laughable	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>If it didn't make me so angry it would be laughable.</i>
luck	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another. <i>Bad luck caused his downfall.</i>
ludicrous	So foolish, unreasonable, or out of place as to be amusing. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
nonsense	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>Nonsense syllables.</i>
pantheistic	Of or relating to pantheism.
prattle	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>Do you intend to keep up this childish prattle.</i>
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A preposterous attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>

proselytize	Convert to another faith or religion. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and proselytize his ideas.</i>
religion	A particular system of faith and worship. <i>Consumerism is the new religion.</i>
ridiculous	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>That ridiculous tartan cap.</i>
silly	A foolish person (often used as a form of address). <i>A silly hat.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>Unreasonable demands.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
<u>unwise</u>	Not appropriate to the purpose. <i>An unwise investor is soon impoverished.</i>
