- Take for granted or as a given; suppose beforehand.
- Think or assume that something is true or probable but lack proof or certain knowledge.
- Used to make a suggestion or a hesitant admission.
- Used to introduce a hypothesis and imagine its development.
- Express a supposition.
- (of a theory or argument) assume or require that something is the case as a precondition.
- Be required to do something because of the position one is in or an agreement one has made.
