- *Power to dominate or defeat.*
- *The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status.*



Synonyms of "Supremacy" as a noun (19 Words)

- advantage** The quality of having a superior or more favorable position.
*It turned out to my **advantage**.*
- ascendancy** The state that exists when one person or group has power over another.
*The poor have a moral **ascendancy** over the rich.*
- authority** (usually plural) persons who exercise (administrative) control over others.
*He has the natural **authority** of one who is used to being obeyed.*
- control** The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc.
*Growing **controls** on local spending.*
- dominance** The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community.
*The worldwide **dominance** of Hollywood.*
- dominion** The territory of a sovereign or government.
*France held undisputed **dominion** over vast areas of Africa.*

hegemony	The dominance or leadership of one social group or nation over others. <i>To say they have priority is not to say they have complete hegemony.</i>
influence	One having power to influence another. <i>Their friends are having a bad influence on them.</i>
leadership	The activity of leading. <i>The party prospered under his leadership.</i>
lordship	A title used to address any British peer except a duke and extended to a bishop or a judge. <i>His lordship over the other gods.</i>
mastery	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>Man s mastery over nature.</i>
power	Of a government or government official holding an office means being in power. <i>His powers of concentration.</i>
predominance	The quality of being more noticeable than anything else. <i>Churches with a predominance of African American members.</i>
primacy	The fact of an item having been presented earlier to the subject (especially as increasing its likelihood of being remembered). <i>London s primacy as a financial centre.</i>
rule	A strip of wood or other rigid material used for measuring length or marking straight lines a ruler. <i>Those who did break the rules would be dealt with swiftly.</i>
sovereignty	The authority of a state to govern another state. <i>The sovereignty of Parliament.</i>
superiority	The quality of being at a competitive advantage. <i>An attempt to establish superiority over others.</i>
sway	Controlling influence. <i>The country was under the sway of rival warlords.</i>

ascendant	Rising in power or influence. <i>The newly ascendant liberal party.</i>
authority	The confidence resulting from personal expertise. <i>Military forces have the legal authority to arrest drug traffickers.</i>
centralize	Concentrate (control of an activity or organization) under a single authority. <i>The Russian government centralized the distribution of food.</i>
chancellor	(in the UK) an officer of an order of knighthood who seals commissions. <i>The Lord chancellor and the judges will consider the application.</i>

dictator	A person who behaves in an autocratic way. <i>My boss is a dictator who makes everyone work overtime.</i>
dictatorship	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc). <i>The effects of forty years of dictatorship.</i>
dogmatic	Relating to or involving dogma. <i>She was not tempted to be dogmatic about what she believed.</i>
dominate	Be greater in significance than. <i>Hispanics predominate in this neighborhood.</i>
domineer	Assert one's will over another in an arrogant way. <i>She doesn't domineer preferring to lead by inspiration rather than by intimidation.</i>
govern	Exercise authority over; as of nations. <i>He does not have the ability to govern himself or others successfully.</i>
hegemony	Leadership or dominance, especially by one state or social group over others. <i>Germany was united under Prussian hegemony after 1871.</i>
indiscriminately	In a random manner. <i>People who are sedentary and who eat indiscriminately.</i>
lord	Make a lord of someone. <i>Sir Cadwallader Pleadwell has been lately lorded.</i>
manageable	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
mastery	The action of mastering a subject or skill. <i>A child's mastery of language.</i>
monocracy	A system of government by one person only.
monopolize	Have or exploit a monopoly of. <i>He monopolizes the laser printer.</i>
oppression	The act of subjugating by cruelty. <i>Beatrice's mood had initially been alarm and a sense of oppression.</i>
overlord	A ruler, especially a feudal lord. <i>The undisputed overlord of the crime family.</i>
potentate	A monarch or ruler, especially an autocratic one.
predominance	The quality of being more noticeable than anything else. <i>Hollywood's continued predominance in the international film market.</i>
premier	The person who is head of state (in several countries). <i>He holds the premier barony in the UK created in 1269.</i>

<u>prevail</u>	Use persuasion successfully. <i>The champion prevailed though it was a hard fight.</i>
reign	Have sovereign power. <i>Henry VIII reigned for a long time.</i>
<u>ruler</u>	A straight strip or cylinder of plastic, wood, metal, or other rigid material, typically marked at regular intervals and used to draw straight lines or measure distances.
sovereignty	Royal authority; the dominion of a monarch. <i>National sovereignty.</i>
<u>suppress</u>	To put down by force or authority. <i>Suppress a yawn.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>A unified force with a supreme commander.</i>
tyrannize	Rule or treat (someone) despotically or cruelly. <i>He tyrannizes over the servants.</i>
