established	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>The established facts in the case.</i>
fated	(usually followed by `to') determined by tragic fate. <i>Fated to be the scene of Kennedy s assassination.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>Parents should be firm with children and not give in to their demands.</i>
foolproof	Not liable to failure. <i>A foolproof identification system.</i>
free from doubt	Unconstrained or not chemically bound in a molecule or not fixed and capable of relatively unrestricted motion.
guaranteed	For which a guarantee is provided; formally assured. <i>The guaranteed bonus is not very high.</i>

incontestable	Not open to question; obviously true.
incontrovertible	Necessarily or demonstrably true. <i>Incontrovertible</i> proof.
indisputable	Not open to question; obviously true. <i>Indisputable</i> or sure proof.
indubitable	Too obvious to be doubted. An <i>indubitable</i> truth.
<u>inevitable</u>	Incapable of being avoided or prevented. The <i>inevitable</i> letter from the bank.
infallible	Incapable of making mistakes or being wrong. No doctor is <i>infallible</i> .
irrefutable	Impossible to deny or disprove. <i>Irrefutable</i> evidence.
irrevocable	Not able to be changed, reversed, or recovered; final. Firm and <i>irrevocable</i> is my doom.
positive	Having a positive charge. <i>Positive</i> philosophy.
predestined	(of an outcome or course of events) determined in advance by divine will or fate. It seemed <i>predestined</i> since the beginning of the world.
reliable	Worthy of being depended on. A <i>reliable</i> source of information.
<u>satisfied</u>	Filled with satisfaction. <i>Satisfied</i> customers.
<u>secure</u>	Financially sound. He was <i>secure</i> that nothing will be held against him.
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. A <i>solid</i> foundation.
<u>stable</u>	Resistant to change of position or condition. <i>Stable</i> prices.
steadfast	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i>Steadfast</i> resolve.
<u>steady</u>	Not liable to fluctuate or especially to fall. The lighter the camera the harder it is to hold <i>steady</i> .
<u>tested</u>	Tested and proved useful or correct. A <i>tested</i> method.

true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>He was a true friend.</i>
<u>trusted</u>	Worthy of trust or confidence. <i>A sure or trusted friend.</i>
<u>trustworthy</u>	Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations. <i>A trustworthy report.</i>
<u>unambiguous</u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>As a horror apartheid is absolutely unambiguous.</i>
<u>undeniable</u>	Unable to be denied or disputed. <i>It is an undeniable fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>
unerring	Always right or accurate. <i>An unerring sense of direction.</i>
<u>unfailing</u>	Reliable or constant. <i>An unfailing test.</i>
<u>unfaltering</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>Her unfaltering energy and determination.</i>
unhesitating	Characterized by quickness and firmness. <i>His reply was unhesitating.</i>
<u>unquestionable</u>	Not open to question. <i>Unquestionable authority.</i>
unswerving	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>Unswerving allegiance.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>Unwavering loyalty.</i>
very likely	Precisely as stated.

absolutely

Used to express and emphasize one's assent or agreement.
An **absolutely** magnificent painting.

<u>certainly</u>	Definitely or positively (‘sure’ is sometimes used informally for ‘surely’. <i>Our current revenues are certainly lower than anticipated.</i>
for sure	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely.
<u>indeed</u>	Used to introduce a further and stronger or more surprising point. <i>A ghost indeed I ve never heard anything so silly.</i>
of course	As might be expected.

dependable	Trustworthy and reliable. <i>A dependable worker.</i>
determinate	Having exact and discernible limits or form. <i>Determinate variations in animals.</i>
doubtless	Without doubt; certainly. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
foolproof	Incapable of going wrong or being misused. <i>Foolproof this appliance.</i>

indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>Indubitably liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
magniloquent	Lofty in style.
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>It was obvious a storm was coming in.</i>
panache	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>He entertained London society with great panache.</i>
positive	Having a positive charge. <i>He made a positive identification of a glossy ibis.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>Reliable information.</i>
reliably	In a faithful manner. <i>Few of these paintings can be reliably dated.</i>
surely	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>If there is no will then surely the house goes automatically to you.</i>
truly	Absolutely or completely (used for emphasis). <i>A truly awful book.</i>
undoubtedly	Without doubt; certainly. <i>It s undoubtedly very beautiful.</i>
unequivocal	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>He was unequivocal in condemning the violence.</i>
unquestionably	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>The awards were unquestionably deserved.</i>
