The proverbially **dour** New England Puritan.

dyspeptic Suffering from dyspepsia.

Showing a brooding ill humor- Bruce Bli.

The princess looked **glum** but later cheered up.

gruff Abrupt or taciturn in manner.

Gruff voices.

Bad-tempered and irritable.

He s grumpy because he hasn t heard from you.

ill-humoured Brusque and surly and forbidding.

ill-natured Having an irritable and unpleasant disposition.

ill-tempered Annoyed and irritable.

irascible Having or showing a tendency to be easily angered.

An **irascible** response.

Giving an impression of melancholy or mystery.

He sat in **moody** silence.

Sullen and ill-tempered.

She was **morose** and silent when she got home.



prickly Having or causing a tingling or itching sensation.

His hair was **prickly** and short.

scowling Sullen or unfriendly in appearance.

short-tempered Quickly aroused to anger.

sour Having a rancid smell.

The kitchen smelled of **sour** milk.

Very irritable.

splenetic A splenetic rant.

sulky Depressingly dark.

Disappointment was making her **sulky**.

sullen Darkened by clouds.

A sullen sunless sky.

testy Easily irritated; impatient and somewhat bad-tempered.

She could see him growing quite **testy** beneath that polished urbanity.

uncivil Lacking civility or good manners- Willa Cather.

He d been short and uncivil with her.

unfriendly Not friendly.

She shot him an **unfriendly** glance.

ungracious Lacking social graces.

Ungracious behavior.

unpleasant (of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude.

The symptoms are extremely **unpleasant**.
