Synonyms of "Surmount" as a verb (26 Words)

beat	Indicate by beating as with the fingers or drumsticks. <i>Drums were beating in the distance.</i>
cap	Follow or reply to (a story, remark, or joke) by producing a better one. <i>He prayed no wit would cap his remark with some repartee.</i>

conquer	To put down by force or authority. <i>They ve conquered new markets in Japan.</i>
<u>crown</u>	Ceremonially place a crown on the head of someone in order to invest them as a monarch. <i>Years of struggle were crowned by a state visit to Paris.</i>
dominate	Be the most important or conspicuous person or thing in. <i>Her husband completely dominates her.</i>
<u>exceed</u>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>She exceeded our expectations.</i>
get over	Be stricken by an illness, fall victim to an illness.
get the better of	Receive a specified treatment (abstract).
master	Make a master copy of a film or recording. <i>She mastered Japanese in less than two years.</i>
outdo	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>She outdoes all other athletes.</i>
outgo	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>He on horseback outgoes him on foot.</i>
outmatch	Be superior to (an opponent or rival). <i>Vast chambers were built which outmatched anything to be seen in Europe.</i>
outperform	(of an investment) be more profitable than. <i>This car outperforms all others in its class.</i>
outstrip	Move faster than and overtake (someone else). <i>Supply far outstripped demand.</i>
<u>overcome</u>	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>You must overcome all difficulties.</i>
overtop	(especially of water) rise over the top of (a barrier). <i>None can overtop him in goodness.</i>
prevail over	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance.
rise above	Rise to one's feet.
scale	Remove scale or scales from. <i>The skin may scale and peel away with itching stinging or burning sensations in the infected area.</i>
subdue	Bring (a country or people) under control by force. <i>She managed to subdue an instinct to applaud.</i>
<u>surpass</u>	Be better than. <i>Pre war levels of production were surpassed in 1929.</i>

tip	Give a tip or gratuity to in return for a service beyond the compensation agreed on. <i>Tip artichokes.</i>
top	Provide with a top or topping. <i>Toast topped with baked beans.</i>
tower above	Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.
triumph over	Prove superior.
vanquish	Defeat thoroughly. <i>He successfully vanquished his rival.</i>

ascent	An instance of rising or moving up through the air. <i>The first balloon ascent was in 1783.</i>
beat	The act of beating to windward sailing as close as possible to the direction from which the wind is blowing. <i>So beat I could flop down and go to sleep anywhere.</i>
clamber	Climb awkwardly, as if by scrambling. <i>I clambered out of the trench.</i>
climb	An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>This young man knows how to climb the social ladder.</i>
climber	Someone seeking social prominence by obsequious behavior. <i>Leopards are great tree climbers.</i>
climbing	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was climbing especially in the Alps.</i>
conquer	Overcome and take control of (a place or people) by military force. <i>Conquer one's desires.</i>
conquest	An act of winning the love or sexual favor of someone. <i>The conquest of Everest.</i>
defeat	An instance of defeating or being defeated. <i>It was a narrow defeat.</i>

exceed	Go beyond what is allowed or stipulated by (a set limit). <i>Their loyalty exceeds their national bonds.</i>
excel	Be exceptionally good at or proficient in an activity or subject. <i>The keeper excelled himself to keep out an Elliott header.</i>
inflation	(cosmology) a brief exponential expansion of the universe (faster than the speed of light) postulated to have occurred shortly after the big bang. <i>A reduction in annual inflation from 84 per cent to 7 per cent.</i>
inhibit	Make (someone) self-conscious and unable to act in a relaxed and natural way. <i>Inhibit the rate of a chemical reaction.</i>
mountain	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>A mountain peak.</i>
mountaineer	A person who takes part in mountaineering.
outstrip	Exceed. <i>During the morning warm up he once again outstripped the field.</i>
overcome	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. <i>She was obviously overcome with excitement.</i>
overpower	Overcome by superior force. <i>They were overpowered by the fumes.</i>
overstep	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He has overstepped the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
overthrow	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>One who is already prostrate cannot be overthrown.</i>
pass	Cause to pass. <i>This fact has passed almost unnoticed.</i>
simplistic	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. <i>Simplistic arguments of the ruling party.</i>
stepladder	A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform.
subdue	Get on top of; deal with successfully. <i>She managed to subdue an instinct to applaud.</i>
subjection	Forced submission to control by others. <i>The country's subjection to European colonialism.</i>
subjugate	Make someone or something subordinate to. <i>The invaders had soon subjugated most of the population.</i>

<u>suppress</u>	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>The rising was savagely suppressed.</i>
<u>surpass</u>	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>One line of soldiers surpassed the other.</i>
transcend	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>He doubts that he will ever transcend Shakespeare.</i>
uphill	Against difficulties. <i>The journey is slightly uphill.</i>
