### Definitions of "Surplus" as a noun

<b>oversupply</b>	An excessive supply. <i>An <b>oversupply</b> of teachers.</i>

<b>profusion</b>	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The <b>profusion</b> of detail.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>superfluity</b>	An unnecessarily or excessively large amount or number of something. <i>They thought the garrison a <b>superfluity</b>.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	The state of being more than full. <i>He died of a <b>surfeit</b>.</i>
<b>surplusage</b>	A quantity much larger than is needed.

### Synonyms of "Surplus" as an adjective (14 Words)

<b>additional</b>	Added, extra, or supplementary to what is already present or available. Called for <b>additional</b> troops.
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<b><u>excess</u></b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The full <b>excess</b> fare had to be paid.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Found some <b>extra</b> change lying on the dresser.</i>
<b>in excess</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>left</b>	Of or belonging to the political or intellectual left. <i>The <b>left</b> bank of a river is bank on your <b>left</b> side when you are facing downstream.</i>
<b>leftover</b>	Remaining; surplus. <i>Yesterday s <b>leftover</b> bread.</i>
<b>redundant</b>	(of a person) no longer employed because there is no more work available. <i>The modules are linked using a <b>redundant</b> fibre optic cable.</i>
<b><u>remaining</u></b>	Not yet used, dealt with, or resolved; outstanding. <i>The few <b>remaining</b> employees are working part time.</i>
<b><u>spare</u></b>	Kept in reserve especially for emergency use. <i>A <b>spare</b> tire.</i>
<b>supererogatory</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was <b>supererogatory</b> of her to gloat.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	Serving no useful purpose; having no excuse for being. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	Denoting a structure or organ occurring in addition to the normal ones. <i>Extra ribs as well as other <b>supernumerary</b> internal parts.</i>
<b><u>unused</u></b>	Infrequently exposed to. <i>We bought an <b>unused</b> car for a change.</i>

- *The firm told 284 employees that they were surplus to requirements.*
- *Surplus cheese distributed to the needy.*
- *Make the most of your surplus cash.*

<b>cloy</b>	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>Too much spicy food <b>cloyed</b> his appetite.</i>

<b>glut</b>	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself. <i>The roads are <b>glutted</b> with cars.</i>
<b>gratuitous</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.</i>
<b>lavishly</b>	In a rich and lavish manner. <i>The book is <b>lavishly</b> illustrated.</i>
<b>myriad</b>	Countless or extremely great in number. <i>The <b>myriad</b> political scene.</i>
<b>needless</b>	(of something undesirable) not necessary because avoidable. <i>I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.</i>
<b>overproduction</b>	The production of more of a product, commodity, or substance than is wanted or needed. <i>So many tracks suffer from <b>overproduction</b>.</i>
<b>oversupply</b>	An excessive supply. <i>An <b>oversupply</b> of teachers.</i>
<b>permissive</b>	Allowing or characterized by great or excessive freedom of behaviour. <i>The Hague Convention was <b>permissive</b> not mandatory.</i>

<b><u>plethora</u></b>	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>A <b>plethora</b> of committees and subcommittees.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>A <b>prolix</b> lecturer telling you more than you want to know.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>redundant</b>	Not or no longer needed or useful; superfluous. <i>The modules are linked using a <b>redundant</b> fibre optic cable.</i>
<b><u>spare</u></b>	Lacking in amplitude or quantity. <i>Few people had <b>spare</b> cash for inessentials.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>supererogatory</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was <b>supererogatory</b> of her to gloat.</i>
<b>superfluity</b>	An unnecessarily or excessively large amount or number of something. <i>A <b>superfluity</b> of unoccupied time.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	A supernumerary person or thing. <i>Books were obviously <b>supernumerary</b> and he began jettisoning them.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>I am <b>surfeited</b> with shopping.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b>verbiage</b>	Excessively lengthy or technical speech or writing. <i>Use concise military <b>verbiage</b>.</i>
