<b>environs</b>	An outer adjacent area of any place. <i>The picturesque <b>environs</b> of the loch.</i>
<a href="#"><u>fringe</u></a>	A secondary festival on the periphery of the Edinburgh Festival. <i>The lunatic <b>fringe</b> of American political life.</i>
<b>local area</b>	Public transport consisting of a bus or train that stops at all stations or stops.
<b>locale</b>	The scene of any event or action (especially the place of a meeting). <i>Her summers were spent in a variety of exotic <b>locales</b>.</i>
<b>locality</b>	An area or neighbourhood. <i>It is a rugged <b>locality</b>.</i>
<b>margin</b>	A profit margin. <i>They won by a convincing 17 point <b>margin</b>.</i>
<b>neighbourhood</b>	A district or community within a town or city. <i>He was reluctant to leave the <b>neighbourhood</b> of London.</i>
<b>perimeter</b>	The boundary line or the area immediately inside the boundary. <i>The <b>perimeter</b> of a rectangle.</i>
<b>place</b>	A point located with respect to surface features of some region. <i>A <b>place</b> in my heart.</i>
<b>quarter</b>	A unit of time equal to 15 minutes or a quarter of an hour. <i>A <b>quarter</b> of a pound.</i>
<a href="#"><u>region</u></a>	The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of. <i>Saxony was divided into four large <b>regions</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>sector</u></a>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The public <b>sector</b>.</i>

<b>skirt</b>	(Fungi) a remnant of the partial veil that in mature mushrooms surrounds the stem like a collar. <i>Bits of beef <b>skirt</b>.</i>
<b>skirting</b>	A remnant of the partial veil that in mature mushrooms surrounds the stem like a collar. <i>A length of <b>skirting</b>.</i>
<b>surroundings</b>	The environmental condition. <i>I took up the time admiring my <b>surroundings</b>.</i>
<b><u>territory</u></b>	An area defended by a team or player in a game or sport. <i>The way she felt now she was in unknown <b>territory</b>.</i>

- *Surround with a wall in order to fortify.*

- *Envelop completely.*



## Synonyms of "Surround" as a verb (20 Words)

- beleaguer** Annoy persistently.

<b>encircle</b>	Bind with something round or circular. <i>The town is <b>encircled</b> by fortified walls.</i>
<b>enclose</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The entire estate was <b>enclosed</b> with walls.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Surround and have or hold within. <i>An act designed to <b>encompass</b> the death of the king.</i>
<b>environ</b>	Surround; enclose. <i>The stone circle was <b>enviromed</b> by an expanse of peat soil.</i>
<b>fence</b>	Enclose or separate an area with a fence. <i>Our garden was not fully <b>fenced</b>.</i>
<b>fence in</b>	Surround with a wall in order to fortify.
<b>gird</b>	Put a girdle on or around. <i><b>Gird</b> your loins.</i>
<b>girdle</b>	Put a girdle on or around. <i>The chain of volcanoes which <b>girdles</b> the Pacific.</i>
<b>go around</b>	Change location; move, travel, or proceed, also metaphorically.
<b>hem in</b>	Utter `hem' or `ahem.
<b>near</b>	Come near to approach. <i>They are drawing <b>near</b>.</i>
<b>palisade</b>	Enclose or provide a building or place with a palisade. <i>He <b>palisaded</b> the ends of the streets and made the town a roughly fortified camp.</i>
<b>ring</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>My uncle <b>rings</b> every Sunday at the local church.</i>
<b>skirt</b>	Form the edge of. <i>He did not go through the city but <b>skirted</b> it.</i>
<b>smother</b>	Envelop completely. <i>It s time for you to leave the house she ll <b>smother</b> you if you remain.</i>
<b>wall</b>	Surround with a wall in order to fortify. <i>One doorway has been <b>walled</b> up.</i>

<b>cover</b>	A covering that serves to conceal or shelter something. <i>He <b>covered</b> left field.</i>
<b>encase</b>	Enclose in, or as if in, a case. <i>My feet were <b>encased</b> in mud.</i>
<b>encircle</b>	Form a circle around. <i>The town is <b>encircled</b> by fortified walls.</i>
<b>enclose</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>I <b>enclose</b> a copy of the job description.</i>
<b><u>enclosed</u></b>	Closed in or surrounded or included within. <i>A dark <b>enclosed</b> space.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Include comprehensively. <i>No studies <b>encompass</b> all sectors of medical care.</i>
<b>engross</b>	Consume all of one's attention or time. <i>They seemed to be <b>engrossed</b> in conversation.</i>
<b><u>engulf</u></b>	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>The cafe was <b>engulfed</b> in flames.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	Wrap up, cover, or surround completely. <i>Fog <b>enveloped</b> the house.</i>
<b>environ</b>	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle. <i>The stone circle was <b>environed</b> by an expanse of peat soil.</i>
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still <b>immersed</b> in her thoughts.</i>
<b><u>orbit</u></b>	The state of moving in an orbit. <i>Mercury <b>orbits</b> the Sun.</i>
<b><u>overwhelm</u></b>	Have a strong emotional effect on. <i>They were <b>overwhelmed</b> by farewell messages.</i>
<b>packaging</b>	A message issued in behalf of some product or cause or idea or person or institution. <i>All the ingredients and <b>packaging</b> are biodegradable.</i>
