<u>questionnaire</u>	A form containing a set of questions; submitted to people to gain statistical information.
quiz	An act of questioning someone. A <b>quiz</b> show.
research	Engaged in or intended for research. The group carries out <b>research</b> in geochemistry.
resume	A summary of your academic and work history.
review	(accounting) a service (less exhaustive than an audit) that provides some assurance to interested parties as to the reliability of financial data. <i>The Director General s end of year review</i> .
sampling	A sample. Five random <b>sampling</b> s collected from wild cats.
sight	A person's view or consideration. The train was an unexpected <b>sight</b> .
<u>sketch</u>	A comical or amusing person or thing. You can see how the first movement evolved from the composer s <b>sketch</b> es.
study	A room used for reading and writing and studying. The third bedroom was used as a <b>study</b> .




