<b>census</b>	An official count or survey, especially of a population. <i>A traffic <b>census</b>.</i>

<b>estimation</b>	The respect with which a person is held. <i><b>Estimations</b> of protein concentrations.</i>
<b>inquiry</b>	A search for knowledge. <i>All lines of <b>inquiry</b> are open.</i>
<b>investigation</b>	An inquiry into unfamiliar or questionable activities. <i>A murder <b>investigation</b>.</i>
<b>opinion poll</b>	The legal document stating the reasons for a judicial decision.
<b>overview</b>	A general review or summary of a subject. <i>A brief <b>overview</b> of the survey.</i>
<b>poll</b>	The number of votes cast in an election. <i>The country went to the <b>polls</b> on March 10.</i>
<b>pricing</b>	The evaluation of something in terms of its price.
<b>probe</b>	An investigation conducted using a flexible surgical instrument to explore an injury or a body cavity. <i>There was a congressional <b>probe</b> into the scandal.</i>
<a href="#"><u>questionnaire</u></a>	A form containing a set of questions; submitted to people to gain statistical information.
<b>quiz</b>	An act of questioning someone. <i>A <b>quiz</b> show.</i>
<b>research</b>	Engaged in or intended for research. <i>The group carries out <b>research</b> in geochemistry.</i>
<b>resume</b>	A summary of your academic and work history.
<b>review</b>	(accounting) a service (less exhaustive than an audit) that provides some assurance to interested parties as to the reliability of financial data. <i>The Director General s end of year <b>review</b>.</i>
<b>sampling</b>	A sample. <i>Five random <b>samplings</b> collected from wild cats.</i>
<b>sight</b>	A person's view or consideration. <i>The train was an unexpected <b>sight</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>sketch</u></a>	A comical or amusing person or thing. <i>You can see how the first movement evolved from the composer s <b>sketches</b>.</i>
<b>study</b>	A room used for reading and writing and studying. <i>The third bedroom was used as a <b>study</b>.</i>

The monetary worth of something, especially as estimated by a valuer.  
*The **valuation** of this property is much too high.*

**view**

Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of.  
*They were soon out of **view**.*

<b>check</b>	A textile pattern of squares or crossed lines resembling a checkerboard. <i>The heat <b>checked</b> the paint.</i>
<b><u>data</u></b>	A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn. <i>Statistical <b>data</b>.</i>
<b><u>demographic</u></b>	A particular sector of a population. <i>The drink is popular with a young <b>demographic</b>.</i>
<b>examination</b>	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>An <b>examination</b> of marketing behaviour.</i>

<b>poll</b>	Cut off the top of a tree or plant typically to encourage further growth pollard. <i>The <b>polls</b> have only just closed.</i>
<b>pollster</b>	Someone who conducts surveys of public opinion. <i>A <b>pollster</b> conducts public opinion polls.</i>
<b><u>questionnaire</u></b>	A set of printed or written questions with a choice of answers, devised for the purposes of a survey or statistical study.
<b>reactant</b>	A substance that takes part in and undergoes change during a reaction.
<b>reactive</b>	Participating readily in reactions. <i>Pupils are <b>reactive</b> to light.</i>
<b><u>reconnaissance</u></b>	Military observation of a region to locate an enemy or ascertain strategic features. <i>An excellent aircraft for low level <b>reconnaissance</b>.</i>
<b>reconnoiter</b>	Explore, often with the goal of finding something or somebody.
<b>reexamination</b>	(law) questioning of a witness by the party that called the witness after that witness has been subject to cross-examination.
<b>reexamine</b>	Look at again; examine again.

<b>reply</b>	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>I am writing in <b>reply</b> to your letter.</i>
<b>respondent</b>	The codefendant especially in a divorce proceeding who is accused of adultery with the correspondent. <i>Most <b>respondents</b> to our questionnaire considered their practices to be in accordance with current medical guidelines.</i>
<b><u>responsive</u></b>	Denoting or relating to a website whose page design changes automatically according to the size of the screen on which it is viewed. <i><b>Responsive</b> reading.</i>
<b>review</b>	Hold a review of troops. <i>The Home Secretary was called on to <b>review</b> Britain's gun laws.</i>
<b>statistic</b>	A datum that can be represented numerically. <i>He was just another <b>statistic</b>.</i>
<b><u>suffrage</u></b>	A vote given in assent to a proposal or in favour of the election of a particular person. <i>Universal adult <b>suffrage</b>.</i>
<b>surveillance</b>	Close observation, especially of a suspected spy or criminal. <i>He found himself put under <b>surveillance</b> by British military intelligence.</i>
<b><u>terrain</u></b>	A piece of ground having specific characteristics or military potential. <i>A mind trying to find its way through difficult theoretical and political <b>terrain</b>.</i>
<b>voter</b>	A person who votes or has the right to vote at an election.
