## Survivor as a Noun

### Definitions of "Survivor" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “survivor” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The remainder of a group of people or things.*
- *One who lives through affliction.*
- *An animal that survives in spite of adversity.*
- *A person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died.*
- *One who outlives another.*
- *A person who copes well with difficulties in their life.*
- *A joint tenant who has the right to the whole estate on the other's death.*



## Synonyms of "Survivor" as a noun (5 Words)

**legacy** (law) a gift of personal property by will.  
*My grandmother died and unexpectedly left me a small **legacy**.*

**residue** Something left after other parts have been taken away.  
*The fine **residue** left after the sorting of tea.*

**subsister** One who lives through affliction.

**trace** A line which represents the projection of a curve or surface on a plane or the intersection of a curve or surface with a plane.  
*We've got a **trace** on the call.*

**vestige** An indication that something has been present.  
*He waited patiently but without a **vestige** of sympathy.*



## Usage Examples of "Survivor" as a noun

- *Only the fittest animals were survivors of the cold winters.*
- *He left his farm to his survivors.*
- *He was the sole survivor of the massacre.*
- *A survivor from last year's team.*
- *The survivors of the fire were taken to a hospital.*
- *She is a born survivor.*





## Associations of "Survivor" (30 Words)

### debris

Scattered pieces of rubbish or remains.

*Workmen were clearing the roads of the **debris** from shattered buildings.*

### **dregs**

The most worthless part or parts of something.

*The **dregs** of society.*

### extant

Still in existence; surviving.

*Specimens of graphic art found among **extant** barbaric folk.*

### **left**

The left wing of an army.

***Left** politics.*

### **leftover**

Not used up.

*Yesterday's **leftover** bread.*

### **lifeboat**

A small boat kept on a ship for use in emergency, typically one of a number on deck or suspended from davits.

<b>lifeguard</b>	An expert swimmer employed to rescue bathers who get into difficulty at a beach or swimming pool.
<b>raft</b>	Transport on or as if on a raft. <i><b>Raft</b> these logs.</i>
<b><u>redemption</u></b>	A thing that saves someone from error or evil. <i>His marginalization from the Hollywood jungle proved to be his <b>redemption</b>.</i>
<b>remainder</b>	Sell cheaply as remainders. <i>Leave a few mushrooms for garnish and slice the <b>remainder</b>.</i>
<b><u>remaining</u></b>	Not used up. <i>Saved the <b>remaining</b> sandwiches for supper.</i>
<b>remains</b>	Any object that is left unused or still extant. <i>Roman <b>remains</b>.</i>
<b><u>remnant</u></b>	Remaining. <i>He sat sewing patchwork cushions with all the <b>remnants</b>.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Take forcibly from legal custody. <i>They have not always been keen to organize <b>rescue</b> excavations to investigate these sites.</i>
<b><u>residual</u></b>	A quantity remaining after other things have been subtracted or allowed for. <i>The eroded <b>residuals</b> of reefs built in relation to earlier higher sea levels.</i>
<b><u>residue</u></b>	A small amount of something that remains after the main part has gone or been taken or used. <i>The <b>residue</b> of the country's colonial past.</i>
<b><u>rest</u></b>	The sign denoting a musical rest. <i>The prosecution <b>rests</b>.</i>
<b><u>salvage</u></b>	Collect discarded material. <i>A <b>salvage</b> operation was under way.</i>
<b><u>scavenge</u></b>	Search for discarded items or food in (a place). <i>She <b>scavenged</b> the garbage cans for food.</i>
<b><u>thrifty</u></b>	Mindful of the future in spending money. <i>He had been brought up to be <b>thrifty</b> and careful.</i>
<b><u>trace</u></b>	Discover traces of. <i>The children <b>traced</b> along the edge of the dark forest.</i>
<b><u>undetected</u></b>	Not perceived or discerned. <i>The thieves escaped <b>undetected</b>.</i>

<b>undiagnosed</b>	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <b>Undiagnosed</b> disease.
<b>undiscovered</b>	Not discovered. The novel had lain <b>undiscovered</b> for years among his papers.
<b>unobserved</b>	Not seen or observed. Managed to slip away <b>unobserved</b> .
<b>unseen</b>	An unseen passage for translation. <b>Unseen</b> natural resources.
<b>vestige</b>	A trace or remnant of something that is disappearing or no longer exists. The last <b>vestiges</b> of colonialism.
<b>vestigial</b>	Not fully developed in mature animals. He felt a <b>vestigial</b> flicker of anger from last night.
<b>waste</b>	Run off as waste. <b>Waste</b> not want not.
<b>wreckage</b>	The remaining parts of something that has been wrecked. Firemen had to cut him free from the <b>wreckage</b> of the car.
